NEW CANADIAN GRAIN ROUTE

Scientific Expedition Sent to SATURDAY Search for One.

HUDSONS BAY TO BE EXPLORED

The Dominion Government to Enforce Obedience to Customs Laws by Yankee Whalers.

St. Johns, Nfld., July 17 .- The Canadian Government has chartered the Newfoundland sealing steamer Neptune to convey a scientific expedition to Hudsons Bay. The expedition will winter at Chesterfield Inlet. Its object is to determine the availability of the region for Canadian grain route. Captain Samuel Bartlett, for several years navigator of the Peary steamers, is in command of the ship, the crew of which consists of Newfoundlanders familiar with ice work. The scientific party is composed of Canadians. The ship will also enforce the Canadian customs laws against American whalers who are operating in Hudsons Bay. This is the second seal ship chartered within a month, the British admiralty recently securing the Terra Nova to convey a relief expedition to the Antarctic steamer Discovery.


