TAFT'S REVISION
List of the Articles That May Come in Free.

Washington, July 18.—Wyoming's senators and representatives are vigorously opposing a lowered tariff on coal, as proposed. They fear that the industry in their state would be ruined by cheap Canadian coal.

Two railroads are now building from Northwestern States to Canada to take the coal fields, and Wyoming capitalists are alarmed.

Senator Clark and Representative Mondell are protesting against any reduction of the present rate of 67 cents per ton, in spite of the fact that the Senate adopted a 60-cent rate. It is understood that the 45-cent rate, if adopted, will provide for no change in the existing rate of 15 cents a ton on slack, but the Elkins amendment, providing that this rate shall apply only to natural slack, shipped as such at the mines, shall be accepted.

Indications are that when the new tariff bill becomes a law the rates on the articles which the President desired to come in free will be as follows: Iron ore, free (present rate 40c per ton); oil, free (now protected by countervailing duties); hides, 7 1/2 per cent ad valorem (present rate 15 per cent); coal, 45c per ton (present rate 67 cents); lumber, probably \$1 25 on rough, with Senate rates on finished. This would be a material reduction throughout the lumber schedule.

A LIVELY DISCUSSION REGARDING VACCINATION
The People's Forum Proposed to Deal With the Matter at the Next Meeting.

At the meeting of the People's Forum last evening in the St. George's Hall, the subject, "Human Nature," was dealt with at considerable length, by Mr. Charles Hill.
The lecturer demonstrated that human nature was not bad, but that bad human beings existed as a result of false education, religion and environment.
The speaker called attention to the teachings of the Christian churches, and argued that men and women were taught to look upon the teachings of Christ from a purely selfish standpoint, and to also pay constantly for their own individual salvation.
It was further stated that the present methods adopted by Christian teachers were responsible for developing and encouraging irresponsibility by leading men and women to believe that they could help themselves by merely believing in the saving power of something or someone outside themselves.
Christ, in the opinion of the leader, meant that men should look upon his great sacrifice only as an example for others to follow, and not as a prop to lean upon.
One member took up the argument that self-preservation was the first law of nature, and the lecturer absolutely denied that such was the case. He then cited many instances from the primitive days of tribal communism right up to the present time, to controvert the doctrine that selfishness is inherent in human nature.
The discussion was so interesting that it was decided to deal with it again at some future meeting.
Next Sunday the subject for discussion will be, "Is vaccination a crime against humanity?"
The lecturer on this occasion will strongly oppose compulsory vaccination, and the medical profession are cordially invited to send capable representatives along to uphold vaccination if it can be morally upheld. A scheme will be advanced to test the powers of the board of education on this particular subject.

SIN BLINDS TO SENSE OF RIGHT

Rev. J. G. Perdue's Sermon in St. Paul's Cathedral on Sunday.

"DAVID AND GOLIATH"
Subject of Rev. A. J. Vining's Sermon in Talbot Street Baptist Church—Other Pulpits Yesterday.

There was a large congregation present at St. Paul's Cathedral last evening. Rev. J. G. Perdue preached, taking as his text, "Thou Art the Man," from II. Samuel, xii, 7.

"Sin," he said, "invariably blinds us to our sense of right and justice, and it continued, destroys them altogether. Some men go so far as to say that sin is a solitary act; that is, they say that certain wrong acts do no harm except to the individual who does them. This is a great mistake. We invariably regard our own actions in a light vastly different to that in which we regard the actions of others, and invariably minimize our shortcomings."

In concluding, Mr. Perdue urged his hearers to flee from sin and make Christ their guide through life.

Talbot Street Baptist Church.
"A Fight to a Finish," was Rev. A. J. Vining's theme at Talbot Street Baptist Church last night, based on the story of the struggle between David and Goliath.

"Notwithstanding that David fought Goliath in the name of the Lord," he said, "he had made the most careful preparation by doing everything well that he had ever had to do. When the opportunity came he was ready to accept it. We can all imitate this example profitably. Everyone should accept his opportunity and do away with procrastination and doubt. David's victory over Goliath meant Israel's victory, and Christ's victory over death means our victory if we accept him."

The pulpit of St. Andrew's Church was occupied yesterday by Rev. Dr. Meldrum, of Cleveland. In the evening Dr. Meldrum spoke from the text Revelations xxi, 16, "The city lieth four square."
