To Kill White Worms.

I will print the formula again so that you may get It right: Sweet almond oil, 1 ounce, rosewater, one ounce; spermacetl, 1/4 ounce; white wax, 1/4 ounce; break the spermaceti and white wax into tiny bits and put into an earthen bowl with the almond oil; set over a tea-kettle containing boiling water, and let them soften gradually; when they have thickened to look almost like cheese, pour into the mixture, drop by drop, the rosewater, and stir with a sliver spoon; add a few drops of violet or rose perfume, and pour quickly into small jars. Do not let the
