LONDON ADDS ANOTHER TO HER LIST OF FAMOUS BOYS

Written by an old London boy, Harvey O'Higgins, the sterling production, "Mr. Lazarus," which is scheduled to open in London, England, for a long run, recalls to mind amongst older citizens many others who forsook the Forest City in days gone by to chance their fortunes in distant places.

Harvey O'Higgins, now a resident of New York, came into prominence several years ago by his series of stories, "The Smoke Eaters." He is the son of a grocer who kept a small store on Dundas street here for many years, just across the road from the grocery store of Moses Wilson, father of Thomas Wilson, the famous packer of Chicago. In fact, "Tom" Wilson and Harvey O'Higgins grew up together, one going in for business pursuits, and the other chasing the rainbow of literary fame until he found success in New York.

There were three of the O'Higgins boys, "Jack," "Tom" and Harvey, and they were educated in St. Peter's School, a private school in London. Harvey later taking a course in Toronto University, his parents having removed to the Queen City. He is a grandson of the late Mayor of London, and his grandparents gave him the advantages of a trip through Europe when quite young.

He first began writing for Toronto newspapers, finally developing into a successful playwright.

Other Famous Boys. Included in the crop of boys who sprang up at the same time and place, are several others who have become famous. Alfred Bryan, now of New York, author of such well-known songs as "Sympathy," "Iola," "Childhood," "Who Paid the Rent For

Mrs. Rip Van Winkle?" "Joan of Arc" and the one that caused such a rumpus in the United States during the war, "I Didn't Raise My Boy to Be a Soldier," sat a couple of seats behind him in St. Peter's School. Bryan has evidently said his piece and is giving way to younger men, but in his time he made a barrel of money out of the songs he wrote.

When Harvey O'Higgins graduated into the collegiate institute in the senior form of the general school was a boy known as "Bill" Penn, who afterward achieved fame by writing a song which was sung around the world, "The Honeyuckle and the Bee." Just at that time "Jim" O'Dea was rolling cigars in a local factory, but filling engagements at night as a song and dance artist in London halls. Later he went on the stage and years ago made a big hit with his song, "The Sweetest Girl in Dixie."

Sweet Singers. About the time that Harvey O'Higgins left London son, Toronto a young man of some literary attainments had met the O'Higgins family through coming to this city to visit his sweetheart, an American girl, who was being educated at the Academy of the Sacred Heart. This rising young genius was "Cy" Warman; and it was while sitting in Victoria Park here that he wrote "Sweet Marie," as a tribute to the sweetheart. He had the song published, and it is to this day remembered affectionately by millions. To the day of Warman's death he and the O'Higgins family were the best of friends.

Thus London boasts of having given to the world some of the most famous heart songs, and now one of her sons is providing England with the best plays on the old London boards.



AT THE ALLEN.

"FRENCH LEAVE" IS CHARMING COMEDY

Scores Favor At Grand With Large Audience.

The Marc Klaw production, "French Leave," which is the offering at the Grand for the first half of this week, was ably presented Monday night by the English cast, which has been preserved intact for the Canadian tour. It is an excellent comedy by Reginald Birkeley, who, by combining unlimited humor with a simple plot, has produced an admirable piece.

The play, on account of the delightful humor and clever acting, lacked a single moment of ennui throughout.

Charles Romano, as a staff captain, gave a forceful characterization, while Madge Surtees' portrayal of the disfigured wife, left no doubt regarding her claim as an actress.

In the role of Capt. Harry Glenister, Jack Murtagh played with considerable force. The other members gave a talented and natural presentation of their respective roles.

The setting of the plot is in a French farmhouse behind the battle lines in France. Capt. Harry Glenister is supposed to have gone to Paris on leave, his wife, expecting to meet him, goes to Paris also. But the captain could not get away. Hence his wife, eager and devoted, schemes to go to him.

A combination of unfortunate coincidences together with an insanely jealous husband result in a tangle. In the end, however, the surprising denouement saves the situation to everybody's satisfaction.

Although "French Leave" is a comedy, worth watching and should make a solid hit for the remainder of its stay in London.
