

Income, One Million a Year. principally from the Duchy of Cornwall, which was created to provide funds for heirs to the throne, who When King George, Wales, was in receipt of the income from the duchy, it amounted to about ninety thousand pounds, rou \$450,000 per annum. Today duchy is worth at least two hundred thousand pounds, nearly a million dollars, per annum to the prince. The duchy is divided into two portions, one in Cornwall bringing in an income of sixty thousand pounds per annum; the other portion consists of

the populous district in south Lon-don known as Kennington. The revenues from this part of the duchy have, I am informed, more than trebled in value during the past fifteen years. Many leases have fallen in, and the estate has been considerably improved. Since the prince acceded to the revenues from the duchy, his personal expenditure probably has not exceeded one-eighth of his income. Since 1912, when he became legally possessed of the duchy at the age of eighteen, he has saved and invested at least one hundred thousand pounds per annum,

probably more.




