Hundreds Visit Victoria Hospital Nurses' Residence Yesterday Afternoon.

IMPORTANT EVENT

London has met Miss Grace Fairley, newly-appointed superintendent of the Victoria hospital nurses' training school. And London is delighted with the personality of the woman who has come from Hamilton to preside over this important institution. Her official introduction to the women of London came yesterday when she was the guest of honor at a reception tendered her at the nurses' residence, by the Victoria hospital women's auxiliary board, the hospital trust, the war memorial hospital committee, and the Victoria nurses' alumnae.

Hundreds of Londoners visited the hospital to be present at this function, which was one of the most important social events of the season. The reception room had been transformed with the gold and bronze autumn foliage while the lights were shaded in the purple and gold colors of the school. Great masses of bronze and yellow dahlias from the garden of Mrs. John McLeod, Evergreen avenue, appeared here and there in tall standards and bowls.
