MURDER FACES MURDER COUNT

Drinks 40,000 Glasses Beer :: Schools Show Patriotism

CURIOUS LONDON NOW LAGS

Yesterday Sees 40,000 Glasses of New Beer Consumed—Normalcy Again.

MANY DELIVERIES

Peculiarities of Place and Custom Give Variance To Hotel Figures.

Forty thousand glasses of new beer were required to slake the thirst and satisfy the curiosity of London yesterday. The approximate figures given out from the hotels today show 38,940 glasses sold. The amount of the new beverage consumed will be in excess of this, for it does not take into account deliveries to residences.

With a "great curiosity" satisfied to varying degrees Londoners today returned to normal ways. The demand for beer fell off to a marked degree. The hotels, compared with yesterday, were more or less deserted.

Bottled beer was the popular drink yesterday. The number of bottles placed on the tables was 12,782, or 881 cases of 24 pints. About 73 kegs and half barrels were used. More than 13,000 glasses of draught beer were sold.

The demand for bottled beer and the draught product varied with the location. One hotel sold 90 cases and four kegs. Another proprietor said that his draught beer went best. All his customers wanted the bottled ale. The largest amount consumed at any one place was 11 cases and 14 kegs. The kegs hold ten gallons each; the half barrels thirteen gallons.

Hotelmen explain the difference in the demand as purely a matter of taste, location and class of trade. The patrons of some hostilities take a fancy to draught beer and rarely ask.

HYDRO MEN OF TORONTO VISIT SIR ADAM AT HOME

Hon. J. R. Cook, W. W. Pope and F. A. Gaby Pay Friendly Call.

BECK IMPROVED

Hears Reports On Work and Shows Horses To Visitors.

Further improvement in the condition of Sir Adam Beck made possible his first contact last evening and today with a number of those who have been most closely associated with him, as a result of which Hon. J. R. Cook, an associate of Sir Adam on the hydro-electric power commission of Ontario; W. W. Pope, the commission's secretary, and F. A. Gaby, the chief engineer, are now guests at Headley.

A Toronto despatch this morning announced that Sir Adam since his return from Baltimore to London has been maintaining a close supervision over the management of the hydro enterprises by telephone from his bedside. It was added that the commission officials had left for London to hold a meeting at the power knight's residence.

Friendly Visit.

It develops, however, that the sojourn of the hydro party is more a friendly than a business visit, and while it is not doubted that Sir Adam would be interested in hearing how affairs have been carried on, this phase of their stay is purely incidental.

This morning Sir Adam personally showed his visitors about the beautiful grounds at Headley, and brought out Melrose, his old favorite, Vulcan, a four-year-old now developing in the Beck stables, and a number of the younger hunters and jumpers which Sir Adam's trainers have in charge.

Is Much Improved.

Sir Adam's friends state that he is very much improved in appearance and vigor and that it is a matter of great satisfaction that he has responded so well to the treatment of his physicians. The hydro knight is still under orders to conserve his strength for a time, and for that reason he has seen no one other than Messrs. Cook, Gaby and Pope. They arrived from Toronto last evening and have no plans as to when they will return.

NEW RUM-RUNNING ROUTE FROM CANADA IS PROBED

Boston, May 22.—With the seizure here today of a large quantity of high quality liquor which formed part of the cargo of the steamer Van, from Jonesport, Maine, federal authorities began an investigation of an alleged new rum running route from Canada over the international boundary to Maine ports. FLIERS DUE BACK THIS AFTERNOON

Amundsen Polar Party Believed Flying Under Most Favorable Conditions.

ALL ARE CONFIDENT

Ready To Plant Norwegian Flag At "Top of the World."

Kingsbay, Spitzbergen, May 22.—(By radio from the steamer Farm).—The Farm and the Hobby, the convoy ships of the Amundsen-Ellsworth polar expedition, which hopped off here in two flying boats for the North Pole at 5:15 yesterday afternoon, are steaming north for Dane's Island to watch for the return of the six fliers.

Should the airmen have found it impossible to land at the pole and have been compelled to begin their return journey without a stop their arrival at Dane's Island is expected any hour. If they have been able to carry out their original plans of staying at the pole for six hours to make soundings and observations they are due back this afternoon.

If the planes are not sighted by late this afternoon the strong probability will exist that one or both of them have come to grief. In event that one plane becomes disabled it is planned that the second shall keep on its way and continue flight alone. Should both be wrecked the six men will strike out on foot for the northern tip of Greenland.

All Are Confident.

The fate of the fliers may not be known until the summer of 1926 as they will be unable to reach Etah, the northernmost settlement in Greenland before next spring, and as vessels do not visit the settlement except in summer. Only engine trouble or a crash in landing can prevent the fliers reaching their goal, the polar experts on the Farm say. The ideal weather that marked the hop off continued at midnight. Colorful Programs Mark Empire Day in Forest City Schools.

PATRIOTIC TALKS

History Prizes Awarded To Many—Kiwanis, K. of C. and Others Take Part.

Empire Day was celebrated by 10,000 school children today in true British fashion. Great and noble traditions of the past were rehearsed and higher and nobler resolves made for the future on behalf of unity and loyalty within the British Empire, than which there has never been a greater in all the world's history.

With almost a unanimous heartiness, London's 24 public schools joined in making the celebrations today such as will be long remembered, and in the past Empire Day doings in the schools here have always been of a very high order.

Outside organizations, including the Kiwanis club, the Knights of Columbus, the various chapters of the I. O. O. F., and the Women's Canadian club participated in the Empire Day programs in the schools. Members of the Kiwanis club who visited a number of the school and delivered appropriate addresses were: S. F. Lawrance, chairman of the board of education; Harry Muir, Rev. (Col.) Wm. Beattie, D.D., C.M.G., Rev. John A. Agnew, W. Benson, A. R. Ford and J. J. McNeil. The I. O. O. F. chapters of the city have undertaken to furnish each and every public school cadet corps in the city with a flag to carry on inspection day, next Wednesday, when Lieut.-Governor Col. Harry Cockshutt will be here to review the corps, and thus they seized upon Empire Day as a suitable occasion to present the flags to the corps throughout the city.

Works of Canadian.

The Women's Canadian club each year presents prizes to the subject of history. This year the prizes consist of works of the Canadian author, Charles G. D. Roberts. Representatives of the clubs visited the schools today and presented the prizes to the winners. H. WINSLOW BEING HELD AT DETROIT

Londoner Faces Charge of Murdering Man On Saturday Night.

WELL KNOWN HERE

Operated Apron Company Here About Five Years Ago.

Hugh Winslow of this city is held by Detroit police on a charge of murder. He is believed to be responsible for the shooting of Joseph Marucci, killed on Agnes avenue, Detroit, on Saturday night.

Winslow, who is 39 years of age, has a widowed mother and two sisters who live on William street, this city. He is a former manager of the Winslow apron company, which operated about five years ago, with offices at 401 Wellington street. The company failed and Winslow left the city for Brantford, where he was married. He lived for a time on a farm near that city, but returned to London last December. Six weeks ago he left for Detroit.

When placed under arrest Saturday night, Winslow declared he was in no way connected with Marucci's murder. He knew the family well, he said, and had met Mrs. Marucci early Saturday night at a downtown intersection.

Widow Held As Witness.

Police offer no motive for the murder, but Mrs. Marucci and her 6-year-old daughter, Marie, are being held at the Detroit women's detention home. Mrs. Marucci will be a material witness. 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UNITED CHURCH MAY BACK "U"

May Erect Building on Western's Campus—Graham's Statement Is Hopeful.

That there is a possibility of the new United Church of Canada taking a special interest in the university of Western Ontario is a story that is continually gaining strength in university circles.

A great deal will depend on the final disposition of Knox College in Toronto. If this building goes to the non-concurring Presbyterians, the United church, then there is every possibility that the new church may erect a building on the local university campus.

The belief is further borne out by the statement of Rev. Dr. J. W. Graham, secretary of education for the Methodist Church in Canada, who, at the London conference on Thursday, said that the United church would take a very active interest in those university centers where there is a real reference to Christianity. For Protestant men and women students.

Dr. Graham, when interviewed, stated that this need was very apparent at Western, and consequently, although he could not speak authoritatively, there was every possibility of the United church establishing a hostel or residence at this university.

Questioned, Dr. Graham said that if such an institution was erected, it would naturally follow that preference would be given to those students holding adherence to the United church.

Dr. Graham also announced that the Methodist church possessed college property, and endowments valued at ten million dollars, which would be turned over to the United church on the consummation of union.

2 PLEAD GUILTY TO STORE THEFT

Fred Maul and Thomas Nopper Stole Four Overcoats May 17.

REMANDED WEEK

Pleading guilty to a charge of breaking, entering and stealing, Fred Maul, 48 years old, and Thomas Nopper, 35, were remanded one week for sentence by Magistrate A. H. M. Graydon in this morning's police court. The charge was laid by C. and R. W. Thayer, clothiers. Nopper and Maul entered their store on the evening of May 17 and stole four overcoats valued at \$80.

Ed. Spencer, counsel for the accused, asked that the men be remanded to allow him opportunity to make representation to the magistrate in person out of court. Mr. Graydon objected at first, declaring that too many petitions had been presented to him asking for leniency on behalf of prisoners. Mr. Spencer assured him that the information which he wished to present before the magistrate could not be revealed in open court.

Maul and Nopper were arrested a few hours after they had committed the robbery. Constable Charles Knight took the two men in custody on suspicion. A search of their homes revealed the stolen overcoats.

PREMIER OLIVER DENIES PROPHECYING ELECTION

Declares Ottawa Doesn't Know Date of Event.

Canadian Press Despatch. Victoria, B. C., May 21.—Premier Oliver, who returned yesterday from Ottawa, today denied a report which credited him with indicating that the next dominion election date possibly would be some time in the fall.

"As to the prospects for an election, that is open for anybody to guess, and I never made any such announcements as were credited to me," the premier said. "They would not tell me at Ottawa when an election was coming. As a matter of fact, from all I can find out, they don't know themselves."

JOYCE WETHERED HOLDS GOLF CHAMPION TITLE

175 HORSES USED AT ONCE TO PUT IN 100-ACRE CROP

King, has been broken at Gadsby, when the neighbors of J. H. Ball, who recently suffered a broken arm, put in his 100-acre crop, 39 outfits were at work at one time and 175 horses.
