

A CRISIS IN CHINA!

Russia Threatens to Hoist the Flag Unless Her Demands are Granted Immediately.

Lack of Money Alone Keeps the Emperor From Declaring for War.

London, March 24.—The Nagasaki correspondent of the Daily Mail says: China, it is reported, refuses to accept Russia's pledge that the occupation of Port Arthur will not be permanent unless the document is countersigned by France and Germany. It is also reported that if she does not accede to the Russian demands before Saturday next Russia intends to seize Port Arthur and Tientsin and to hoist the Russian flag there.

Pekin, March 23.—During the last few days the constant consultations between the Emperor and high officials of state have shown that China is finally alive to her serious situation. One night the Emperor actually decided to resist Russia by force of arms as to the value of Russia's promises of friendship and during a recent discussion the Emperor exclaimed: "Why did I not see this sooner?"

Germany is beginning to experience some difficulty in the province of Shantung, where natives declare that in spite of the Emperor's proclamation, they will oppose with violence the construction of the projected railway.

HAWAIIAN ADVICES.
Contract Labor to Cease in the Islands Coming March Change—The Speckles Family Troubles.

San Francisco, March 23.—The steamer Belgic from Honolulu brought the following advices:

Honolulu, March 15.—Mrs. Thomas Watson, nee Emma Speckles, has taken the first step to recover the property in this city and in the islands amounting to more than a million dollars, which she deeded back to her father, Claus Speckles, at the time she married. Her attorneys have placed with G. J. Irwin & Co. notice for all the occupants of the property in dispute ordering them to vacate at once.

Wm. Easie and several others leave Honolulu to-day bound for the Klondike. Easie represents an island company. He carries funds for outfitting and prospecting purposes.

The 4,000 ton British steamship Otway, bound from Sydney to Victoria with 300 Klondikers, is expected here daily.

A bill is about to be introduced in the legislature providing that any contract labor who on July 1st do not contract labor will be enforceable in the Hawaiian Islands. The central committee has endorsed the bill by carrying the motion to the effect that the penal feature of labor contracts be abolished by the present legislature. The Hawaiian legislature will be convened on July 1st for the purpose of enacting laws for the coming year. The committee states that there is a scarcity of this class of labor in the islands and is compelled to send to the United States several times a year for sufficient small coins to meet the needs of the business. The new coins will be minted at San Francisco, and this government will make a handsome profit on the transaction.

MURDERER SENTENCED.
Self Defence Story Not Credited and He Must Hang in One Month.

Nelson, March 22.—Doyle, alias Sullivan, came up to-day before Justice Irving and a jury to be tried for the murder of the man Connors at Kuskokwam last February. The case was very short, three witnesses for the crown giving evidence of the shooting. The prisoner was represented by J. J. O'Brien. He had no witnesses and he did not go into the box, but made a statement from the dock. The jury after 12 minutes' deliberation returned a verdict of guilty, and the prisoner was sentenced to be hanged on April 22nd. The prisoner broke down at the close.

INTERVENTION IN CUBA.
Impending on Humane Grounds Apart From the Findings of the Maine Court of Inquiry.

Washington, March 23.—The prevailing impression among the Republican leaders of the house is that the President will intervene in Cuba on humane grounds, but it is positively stated by one of them who is close to the President that the intervention will not come until after the report of the board of inquiry into the Maine disaster goes to Congress.

"The two questions will be treated separately," said he to-day, "and the message relative to Cuba will be sent to Congress some ten days later than the Maine question."

The Cuban message, as foreseen by a prominent Republican, will waive the question of the Maine disaster and putting aside that occurrence will be in effect a declaration to Spain that in present methods of warfare in Cuba must cease. It will result in intervention in case Spain demurs. The message will be accompanied by the reports of the consultants in Cuba.

The information at the capital is that already \$25,000,000 of the \$50,000,000 appropriated for national defence has been expended or contracts entered into for its expenditure.

LONDON, March 24.—The Daily Chronicle says: "We learn that the long cabinet council on Monday was to consider an intimation from the Marquis of Salisbury of his desire, acting under medical advice, to resign both his membership and the foreign secretaryship. Our news is obtained from a source usually trustworthy, but the crisis may take a few weeks to develop, the Queen being abroad."

"Lord Salisbury's successors are almost certain to be the Duke of Devonshire as Premier and Mr. J. Balfour as Secretary of State for foreign affairs."

CHARLTON SAT UPON.

His Sunday Newspaper Bill Made a Laughing Stock and Thrown Out by the Commons.

Ottawa, March 23.—(Special).—Mr. Charlton's bill to prevent the publication and sale of newspapers on Sundays was slaughtered by the Commons to-night. Mr. Charlton moved the third reading, but on division of 65 to 58 it was decided to go into committee again to discuss Dr. Montague's amendment to prevent the sale of newspapers purporting to be published on Sunday. Mr. W. F. Maclean then moved that the committee rise without reporting. After an amusing debate the motion carried by 69 to 43, and the bill was then killed.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Mr. Foster, and all the ministers present, save Tarte, voted with the minority.

FOR YUKON STOREHOUSES.
Fifteen Thousand Tons of Supplies Going in for Alaska Commercial Company Alone.

San Francisco, March 23.—During the coming season the Alaska Commercial Company proposes to get 15,000 tons of supplies up the Yukon river and distribute them among its various trading posts from Behring sea. Last year 20,000 tons were forwarded, but most of this was started late in the season after the Klondike excitement began, and some thousands of tons got no further than St. Michaels. This year the company will have 13 river steamers moving with heavy loads to the value of \$1,000,000. Five will be new ones. They were built on the Ohio river and have been shipped to Unalakleet. They are expected to start on their trip between June 1st and freezing time. The company's fine new 2,500 ton ocean steamer St. Paul is now being built at the Union Iron Works, will be launched at mid-night on April 6.

SUCCESSION DUTY.
Ontario Judge Decides That Local Tax Applies Only to Property in the Province.

Toronto, March 23.—(Special).—Judge McDougall to-day decided that the Ontario government cannot collect succession duty on the whole estate of G. R. Renfrew, furrier of Toronto and Quebec, who died in England in September, leaving an estate of half a million, of which only \$85,000 was in Ontario shares. The Ontario treasury claimed the right to collect the regular duty of 2½ per cent on the whole estate out of the property in Ontario, but the judge decided that the Ontario government has no right to tax such property as is situated in the province or brought here for distribution.

THE MAINE MYSTERY.
Records Searched in Vain for Any Precedent Fitting This Peculiar Case.

Washington, March 23.—The remark attributed to Admiral Sigsbee that West yesterday to the effect that the case of the Maine was perhaps the most peculiar in the history of modern times, is interpreted here as clearly indicating that the direct responsibility for the explosion cannot be placed.

During the progress of the investigation the law officers of the government have been giving the legal side of the question their close attention, and the statement is made that the case of the Maine is indeed peculiar. The records, it is said, do not show that ever before in the history of the United States has a set of one power been destroyed in the waters of another without the cause of the disaster and the responsibility for it being known beyond dispute.

THE BANK VAULT ATTACKED.
Burglars Use Explosives in an Ontario Country Branch and Exchange Shots With Clerk in Charge.

Havana, March 24.—The body of Lieut. F. W. Jenkins of the Maine was found early this morning near the torpedo tube at the rear of the bank vault. The body was recognized as being that of the man who was killed by a gold clad ring with a blood-stone seal with his monogram.

NEW HAMBURG, Ont., March 24.—(Special).—The branch of the Western Bank of Canada here was entered early this morning by burglars who blew open the door of the vault door. The explosion alarmed George Sterling, a young bank clerk who was asleep in a room overhead. He fired at the burglars through a hole in the floor, first with a revolver and then with a rifle. The burglars fired back at him and then retired having secured nothing.

QUARRELLING FOR RELIGION.
London, March 24.—A little Christian boy named Jones came home from school on Monday last crying and complaining that a Jewish boy had been beating him on the head with a stone. The boy died yesterday from the effects of the beating.

VICTIM OF MENINGITIS.
Sudden End of a Fresno Lady's Trip North—Dawson Killed, but Gold Very Plentiful.

Nanaimo, March 23.—(Special).—The steamer City of Topeka has arrived at Departure Bay from Skagway with thirty-five passengers, among whom is S. J. Wall, of Fresno, who went to Skagway accompanied by his wife a few weeks ago. Mr. Wall caught the spinal meningitis and as a result died on the 16th. Her remains were brought south by the City of Topeka and are now being buried in the cemetery here.

Mr. Jos. T. Berry, of Portland, saw four Dawsonians who arrived at Nanaimo on Friday last. They report no scarcity of provisions and that matters are exceedingly orderly, with no special news from the interior. The wind blew from the north and the snow fell from the south on Tuesday night.

CHINA HAD TO YIELD.

All Russian Demands Agreed To With But Poor Pretence of Sovereignty Maintained.

Port Arthur and Tientsin Surrendered for Twenty-five Years for Naval Stations.

Railway Charter and Sea Terminals for the Proposed Road Also Granted.

London, March 24.—The Pekin correspondent of the Times says: China on Wednesday agreed to all the Russian demands. The following are the concessions:

A lease of Port Arthur for 25 years as a fortification and naval base.

A lease of Tientsin for 25 years, as an open port and as the terminus of the trans-Manchurian railway with a right of fortification.

The right for the Russians to construct a railway from Peking to Tientsin and to the sea.

China gave up its claims to nominal sovereignty rights, which, however, she is powerless to assert, the lease being equivalent to cession.

HALIFAX TO WASHINGTON.
Simultaneous Visit of Three Officers of the British Garrison Causes Much Speculation.

Halifax, March 24.—(Special).—Capt. Kent, of the Royal Engineers, who is a torpedo expert, and who is in charge of the submarine defences of Halifax harbor, left suddenly for Washington to-day.

Another British officer, Col. Struthers, who is in charge of the Royal Artillery, also left for Washington to-day.

MISSOURI WEATHER.
A Blizzard and Floods Making Things Unpleasant at St. Louis—Arkansas and Illinois Suffer Also.

St. Louis, March 24.—A regular blizzard prevails in St. Louis and vicinity, extending down into Arkansas and part of Illinois. The temperature shows a drop of 48 degrees since yesterday.

MANSLAUGHTER CHARGED.
An Ontario Fatality for Which a Reckless Shooter Must Stand Trial.

Brockville, Ont., March 24.—(Special).—The inquest on the body of J. N. Scribner, a deaf man, shot in North Augusta by Wm. Pear, resulted in the verdict that Scribner came to his death from a shot from a gun fired by Pear.

MANITOBA AND NORTHWEST.
Farmers' Grievances as to Elevators Heard by a Special Committee—The Edmonton Route.

Winnipeg, March 24.—(Special).—The agricultural committee of the Manitoba legislature to-day heard arguments pro and con on the alleged elevator monopoly in Manitoba. Small grain dealers who appeared urged that the privileges of loading grain direct on to the cars from flat warehouses be granted at all Manitoba points.

Winnipeg clearing house returns for the week ending to-day were \$1,250,000. The clearing house members, including banking firms, who are coming West to enter upon new fields of work, arrived to-night.

NEWS OF VANCOUVER.
A Rush of Population—Snowstorm Makes Travel Unpleasant—Report From the Skitline.

Vancouver, March 24.—(Special).—The city is considerably crowded and the city are renting houses from month to month and are in constant fear of having the rents raised or being obliged to move.

"A STRANGER IN NEW YORK."
Hoyt's Latest Success to Amuse Victorians on Tuesday Evening Next.

At the Victoria theatre next Tuesday local theatre-goers will have an opportunity of passing the time of the latest success, "A Stranger in New York." The play is one which tells of life as we find it to-day in the metropolis.

Immediately on receipt of the official dispatches from an American naval attaché abroad, briefly announcing the sailing of the fleet, the fact was made known to the President, and an earnest conference was held between him and Secretary Long and Assistant Secretary Roosevelt.

The serious nature of the move was fully considered and the President advised that naval strategists regarded it as essential that this torpedo fleet should not be allowed to reach western waters. What, if any, conclusion was reached, is not known.

Later on in the day, the Spanish minister called at the state department and spent some time with Judge Day. It was naturally inferred that the approach of the Spanish fleet was one of the subjects referred to. Whether, however, there was any suggestion against the move was not discovered by the press.

Following the fleet's announcement important news came rapidly. The first part of the announcement was that a squadron of the fleet was in command of the Iowas, but more recently has been conspicuously before the public as president of the fleet.

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WAR CLOSE TO HAND.

Spain Must Humble Herself or Meet the Armed Forces of the United States.

Intervention to End Cuban Mischief Whatever the Turn of the "Maine" Affair.

Such Believed to Be Present Intention—Craft Bought for Torpedo Service.

Washington, March 24.—The last day before the arrival of the report of the Maine court of inquiry was one of unusual activity in all official quarters. Advice came early that the Spanish torpedo flotilla had sailed from the Canaries for Porto Rico and from this moment the most energetic warlike measures followed one another in constant succession.

The movement of this fleet had been watched with the keenest interest as it was felt to involve serious possibilities which might compel the United States government to protest against the movement as of a hostile character.

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The Maine. This was refused by Captain General Blanco for the reason, it is officially explained, that as there are civil disposed persons who insist that the Maine was blown up from external causes, the Spanish authorities do not want the wreck destroyed as it affords all the evidence obtainable as to the actual cause of the disaster.

Lieut. Commander Marx and his naval companions, bearing the report of the Maine court of inquiry, reached Washington at 9:35 to-day to-night. They were met at the station by an official of the navy department who informed them that the secretary of the navy would not receive the report to-night.

ROSSLAND'S PROGRESS.
Substantial Blocks Shortly to be Erected—War Eagle Company Buy Another Mine.

Rossland, March 23.—The Moneta mine, adjoining the War Eagle and capitalized for \$750,000, has been sold to the War Eagle company at the rate of 12½ cents per share. Ross Thompson and John R. Cook were the principal stockholders in the Moneta.

Ross Thompson, the father of Rossland, has decided to erect a handsome three-story brick block on the corner of Columbia avenue and Spokane street.

The Bank of Montreal and Bank of Halifax will build handsome brick buildings on Columbia avenue next summer.

C. O'Brien Reddin has retired from the Reddin-Jackson stock broking firm and will open a broker's office with his brother, W. R. Reddin.

DISSATISFIED FIREMEN.
Chinese Members of the "Centennial's" Crew In Trouble—A Strike That Means a Mutiny.

There was trouble approaching mutiny on board the steamship Centennial yesterday morning, and as a result several members of the Chinese crew occupied temporary quarters at the police station during the greater part of the day.

They had come here with the ship from China, and were signed at Shanghai for a period of nine months at 18 cents per month. The ship has made this port her headquarters in connection with the Klondike trade in which she has made her initial trip.

The Chinamen have discovered that 18 cents in China means but about \$9.00 in our money, with a much reduced purchasing power.

It was when they received an advance on Tuesday night, and got into conversation with their friends in Chinatown, they concluded that they would strike for higher wages. They neglected, however, to take into consideration that, being armed seamen, refusing duty as they were yesterday when the chief engineer desired to turn his engines over, was practically mutiny.

Their glowing dreams of a strike immediately followed by an increase of pay were rudely distributed by Sergeant Langley in police uniform who took them in charge. It is expected that they will have realized their position fully by to-day, and that when the Centennial is ready to sail for another round trip, they will be equally ready to do their duty—although still at the 18 cents.
