BRITISH PATENT LAW **BRINGS FACTORIES**

Mr. Lloyd-George Says it Will Give Work to Many Thousands

London, March 13.—Some of the bigger manufacturers of analine dyes, whose patents are in German hands, are taking steps to establish factories in England as a consequence of the mew patent law introduced by David Lloyd-George, president of the Beard of Trade, which came into effect January 1, and which empowers the revocation of patents unless the process is carried on in the United Kingdom. The mew law is expected to have great results in bringing trade to Great Britain. It is still the subject of negotiations between Great Britain and Germany, the latter of which is seeking to secure a respite from the enforcement of its provisions.

The propeller was made of two blades of steel measuring six feet two at inches in diameter, having a pitch of four feet and weighing 19 pounds. The aerodrome proper weighs 195 pounds, of the engine and apparatus about 200 pounds, and the operator 175 pounds, thus giving the entire machine and operator a weight of 560 pounds.

The total supporting surface, including tall and rudder, was 453 squared feet, which gives a flying weight of 1,23 pounds per square foot. The main wing of the aerodrome consists of two surfaces having a space of forty-five feet from tip to tip and an average depth from fore to aft of 5 feet 5 inches. The surfaces are of the double wire design, and are bowed laterally.
