FULL TEXT OF HON. MR. FLEMMING'S LICENSE REPORT

Matter Fully Set Forth in Report to Government of His Work While in Campbellton—Reasons For Changes Cited. LICENSES RECOMMENDED.

To the Honorable J. D. Hazen, Premier and the members of the Legislative Council, of the Province of New Brunswick. Sir,—I have the honor to submit to you the evidence taken by me as commissioner appointed to add investigation into the operations of the Liquor License Act in the Town of Campbellton and to investigate the conduct of all or any of the officials charged with the enforcement of the said Act, under commission issued by the Lieutenant Governor on the 1st day of June, A. D. 1923.

Complying with instructions of said commission I proceeded to Campbellton and held an investigation on June 17th and 18th last. Mr. J. H. Taylor, Chairman of the Commission, Mr. S. J. Abingdon and Mr. F. C. Russell, Commissioners, Mr. W. P. Gray, the Lieutenant Governor's commissioner appointed to investigate the operations of the Liquor License Act in the Town of Campbellton, and to investigate the conduct of all or any of the officials charged with the enforcement of the said Act, under commission issued by the Lieutenant Governor on the 1st day of June, A. D. 1923.

On May 4th last Mr. W. P. Gray on behalf of the Campbellton branch of the Temperance Federation, submitted a letter to the Provincial Secretary setting forth the following statements: That Belanger Bros. were fined for Sunday selling Oct. 19th, 1917, that their premises were raided March 2, 1919, the same being Sunday, and that gambling was going on, one of the proprietors and five others were fined for Sunday selling, that the proprietors, Messrs. Belanger Bros. were fined for Sunday gambling and also that Belanger Bros. were fined for selling a minor on April 25th last.

The statement in regard to Isaac Boudreau was that he had applied for a license to sell liquor in the town of Campbellton at the proper time that a petition was circulated and signed by about twenty of the residents of ward 2, protesting against the granting of a license to Boudreau, that the petition was filed with the Inspector at least four days previous to the meeting of the Commission, that when license being granted the application was changed from ward 2 to ward 1.

The Inspector reported recommending the petitions of Belanger Bros. and Boudreau, and report of the application for a license to sell liquor in the town of Campbellton at the proper time that a petition was circulated and signed by about twenty of the residents of ward 2, protesting against the granting of a license to Boudreau, that the petition was filed with the Inspector at least four days previous to the meeting of the Commission, that when license being granted the application was changed from ward 2 to ward 1.

In the case of the applications for wholesale licenses the Inspector reported recommending the application of Daniel O'Keefe and reported in favor of Numa Bernathes and Isaac Boudreau. I am unable to determine upon what principle the Inspector proceeded in making up his report upon the different applications for licenses, in some cases he simply says that he is unable to recommend or does recommend as the case may be, in other cases he states why he makes his recommendation. The Inspector did not comply with sub-section 1 of Section 11 not having stated in each and every case
