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MUCH BIG GAME
OUT OF SEASON

Members Tell of Lumber Men Feeding Moose out of Season Information not Wanted.

UNPALATABLE TRUTHS

Last week in the house the north shore members had an inning at the expense of the government which was not too well received, and which showed clearly that the government provision for game warden was a farce. It is well known that the very times game warden are most needed is the time they are taken off duty under the grand-mobility plea of needless expense, leaving the woods unprotected and allowing wholesale slaughter along the coast and other game both in and out of season.

On the item of \$35,000 for fish, forest and game protection, Mr. Currie said the enforcement of the game law on the North Shore was a farce. One government official who conducted lumber camps, fed his men in or out of season on moose meat. The game warden in Restigouche county had fought it necessary to turn his team off the roads to allow loads of moose meat to pass. This moose meat had been sold in his own cook house, for two years, the cook being in league with the violators.

Hon. Mr. McLeod said that it was pretty nearly time the honorable gentleman did something more than come here to the house and talk about it. There was nothing like that in other counties.

Mr. Currie said it was the same in other parts of the province.

Hon. Mr. McLeod said that the honorable gentleman could not very well be in a position to get correct information when he was out in British Columbia.

Mr. Currie said that some work of education to show the people the value of the big game of the province ought to be undertaken. A colony of beaver had disappeared in Restigouche county.

Hon. Mr. Fleming invited the honorable gentleman to give him in confidence the information which he said he had as to the alleged violations of big game law. The honorable gentleman had said something about the beavers of the province, and he knew that in sections of Northumberland and Victoria counties that the beaver were becoming so plentiful that he would probably suggest to the committee of the house when amendments to the game act were considered that the game warden be allowed to take a certain number of beaver from certain streams on permits from surveyor-general. The idea would be to have this work done along the same lines as followed in Ontario, where warden were paid for taking animals and the proceeds were paid into the province.

HON. C. H. LABILLOIS

Mr. Labilloy said that he had letters from responsible men in Restigouche county telling of the great slaughter of game. Two men had killed as much as three sleigh loads, according to one of these letters, and an official of the government had gone out with a net in one night and had taken as many as fifteen or twenty salmon.

Hon. Mr. McLeod—Do you know that to be true or are you repeating rumor which has come to you?

Mr. Labilloy said that he had no information himself, but that he had information from reliable men in the county of Restigouche, both Liberals and Conservatives, on which he founded the statements he was making to this house. He and his colleagues were calling

The old saying "As happy as a king," has gone out of favor. A twentieth-century King has to keep a tight hand not only on his wife and children, but also upon the whole of his wide circle of Royal relatives.

The worst and most bitter of all Royal quarrels was that which resulted in the feud between the late King Leopold of Belgium and his daughters Princess Louise and Princess Stephanie. This led to Princess Stephanie suing her father for her portion of the property left by her mother.

The rupture between Stephanie and her father was caused by her marriage to Count Louvay, and the bitterness of the King's feelings may be judged by the fact that he refused to be reconciled, even over the Queen's dead body.
