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**THE PEOPLE.**

It was a jovial company that assembled at the Montreal house last night to celebrate the thirtieth annual meeting of the People's Society. This society is of a novel and peculiar character. It has neither constitution nor rules, it imposes no dues and possesses no secrets.

The meeting last night was probably the happiest the People have yet had. There was a large turnout of the old times who have long battled for the rights of the people, and a number of new members were initiated. The society boasts of having for its president a first and general gentleman in the person of Geo. T. Robinson, who has held that position since the society's inception with credit to himself and honor to the people who put him there.

The body of the late Edwin Harris, of St. John's Lodge, St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, was interred in the cemetery at 11 o'clock. The funeral was held in the presence of a large number of friends and members of the church.

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**MAN AND WIFE KILLED.**

Another has been added to the long list of accidents which have occurred at the junction of King street and the Grand Trunk railway. George Valentine, a Pickering farmer, and his wife were coming into town last night with a horse and buggy and a quantity of produce for the market. They were driving along the Kingston road and at about half-past eight reached the Grand Trunk crossing.

The horse had crossed clear of the track when an engine, backing southward, struck the buggy with tremendous force, knocking the body of it into a ditch twenty feet from the track on the south side of the Kingston road. Valentine was thrown into the ditch under the body of the buggy while the woman was flung head first through a fence on the south side of the road, breaking her neck. She was instantly killed.

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
