

COLLEGES FOR WOMEN.

MISS HELEN GLADSTONE WRITES OF NEWNHAM'S CLASSIC HALLS.

The Daughter of the Great Old Man Gives a Most Interesting Glimpse of This Famous Institution for the Higher Education of Women—How Girls Are Brought Up.

It is often amusing, but often not less instructive, to hear complete outsiders talk about women's colleges as they conceive them to be.

It is now comparatively rare to meet with the utter and unreserved condemnation of former days. Women's colleges are an established fact; they have received much favor from our ancient universities.

But with all this talk there is little knowledge of the every-day work and aspect of these institutions. It is not until one has seen the interior of one of them that she can form a correct opinion.

Newnham College, aims primarily at supplying the highest education to women and to receive such education and are fitted to receive it. It is established in Cambridge, and its students take the University courses.

There is now so wide a choice of subjects at Cambridge, that students are able to find appropriate directions in which to work, and the college, which has always avoided "red tapes," readily allows, in cases where there seems desirable, special courses of work to be taken without examination.

The greater number of students work for a degree, and some for a diploma, and some aim only at less examinations or take no examinations at all, and generally remain a shorter time.

Adequate supervision and discipline have always been provided, but rigid rules are as few as possible; self-government is generally encouraged and students altogether are treated as responsible young women and not as school-girls.

Some objectors are greatly concerned lest the draw women from the lively contact with the world, and will do so only in ways which are wholly good; namely, it somewhat raises the standard of what women can honor and care for; and, by helping to give honorable usefulness to the lives of women, it tends to keep them from those incongruous, unattractive, unworthy marriages which are the result of happy and worthy motives for marriage.

Many students come to Newnham to fit themselves for the profession of teaching, and all students are furnished for them as well as for those who wish to come; and it is also desired that with simplicity in household arrangements, comfort and beauty should be as far as possible combined.
