Moved by Mr. Kelly, seconded by Mr. Hand, that the clerk be instructed to request the Council of Ennis-Killen to send one treasurer a check for the annual amount due this township for their share in the cost of the construction of the drains, on the town line between our respective townships.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Kelly, seconded by Mr. Hand, that aid to the widow of Ellis, be granted to widow Ellis.—Carried.

Elisha Saunders was appointed Pathmaster in place of James Saunders, deceased.

Moved by Mr. Ansley, seconded by Mr. Kelly, that the clerk be instructed to draft a by-law in blank for the payment of members of the council for a per diem allowance, for attendance at meetings of Council and committees, with mileage for the distance travelled.

Moved by Mr. Kelly, seconded by Mr. Hand, that the clerk be instructed to draft a by-law repealing by-law No. 15, of 1879, and substituting instead one making the remuneration of members of the council, to be \$50. per annum for all services.—Amendment carried.

Lambton Postal Returns.

OFFICIAL REPORT OF BUSINESS TRANSACTIONS IN THE POST OFFICES OF LAMBTON FOR THE YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 1879.

From the Postmaster-General's Report we extract the following, which will be of interest to many of our readers. It will be seen in a moment that the salaries of country postmasters are now based on the actual amount of matter mailed at their respective offices, and not on the receipts of postage stamps only, as formerly. With reference to the "forward allowance" for Sarnia Post Office, we might remark that \$200 of the specified amount is for Lake Superior service, granted the late postmaster. The returns below are for the twelve months ending on the 30th of June last:

LICENSE RETURNS.

EXTRACT FROM THE OFFICIAL REPORTS TO THE PROVINCIAL SECRETARY—THE FIGURES for Lambton.

The fourth annual report of the License Branch of the Provincial Secretary's Department, comprising returns from all the Branches of License Commissioners in the Province, has recently been distributed by the Ontario Government. The following particulars, showing how the system works in the Province of Lambton, will be read with interest. Following is a comparative statement showing the number of licenses issued in each municipality during the past three years:

Postmaster issued 1 six months license in 1878-9 and 1 in 1879-80. Watford issued 1 extended shop license in 1877-8.

MANITOBA.

WINNIPEG. Flour has gone up 25c per hundred. Wheat is 95c to \$1, and oats 60c per bush.

John Ryan's accepted tender for the construction of the temporary railway bridge is \$8,000.

Friday night's train brought to this city three Canadian families who are leaving the United States after some years' residence there.

A gambler named Horse shot one Adams through the neck at Rat Portage on Friday night. Adams is reported to be fatally wounded.

The building of a temporary railway between Winnipeg and the junction with the main line progresses very slowly on account of the frequent snow storms. Last month only four miles of the track was laid. A train with material being struck in the snow on the 22nd inst., when a short distance out, and a locomotive which was in rear returned. Since then the track has drifted over. Soft weather has now set in, and it is very doubtful whether it will be practicable to complete the track from here to Stony Mountain in time to get the rolling stock and material there before the ice on the extensive intervening swamps becomes unsafe. In that case the proposed plan of building a permanent track southward to Winnipeg from the gravel pits at Stony Mountain cannot be accomplished this season.

A correspondent, writing from Willow Brook, Beaconsfield, Man., gives this advice to intending emigrants:—We like all those who come here in the spring, have our share of hard ships and trials, and though we have yet to rough it, we enjoy the healthful life which a Manitoba farm affords.

Experience has taught me that—1st. In order to travel here in the Spring without undue fatigue it is necessary to bring as few things as possible and of the most useful kind and of the best description, a few of which I shall enumerate—stout walking shoes and leggings, wollen socks, corduroy and duck pants, the latter to be lined with brown holland; water proof coat and cap; leather skin suits to be worn over wollen suits. The former to have gauntlets, the latter to be knit with double stitch. In the autumn no difficulty will be experienced in bringing in supplies, for the roads then are excellent. I travelled last November with oxen and laden carts six miles in two days.

2nd. It is better for the intending settler to secure his land before purchasing his cattle &c. for he is then at liberty to go where he pleases, and is enabled to become acquainted with the soil before starting with his carts on his journey. Besides, he might meet with some one who having become disheartened would gladly sell out at a discount. In "land-hunting" it is well to carry a small stock of provisions, matches and a small hatchet.

3rd. It is a good plan to have two tents a small one to camp on the way and a large one about 10 ft. x 12 ft. to live in on the farm until the house is built. Those made by Chris. Sonne 13 Common street, Montreal, are to be recommended, being far superior to those sold in Winnipeg.

4th. The settler the first year should not put in more than a crop of potatoes, so as to be free to cut his house and stable logs before the flies and mosquitoes become troublesome. He then can utilize the time in the middle of the day in erecting his house while the oxen are resting on account of the flies and heat. In this way he will provide without undue haste a shelter against the wintry blasts of this northern region. To prevent the mud between the logs from cracking in winter it should be put on during the warm weather and kept well pained.

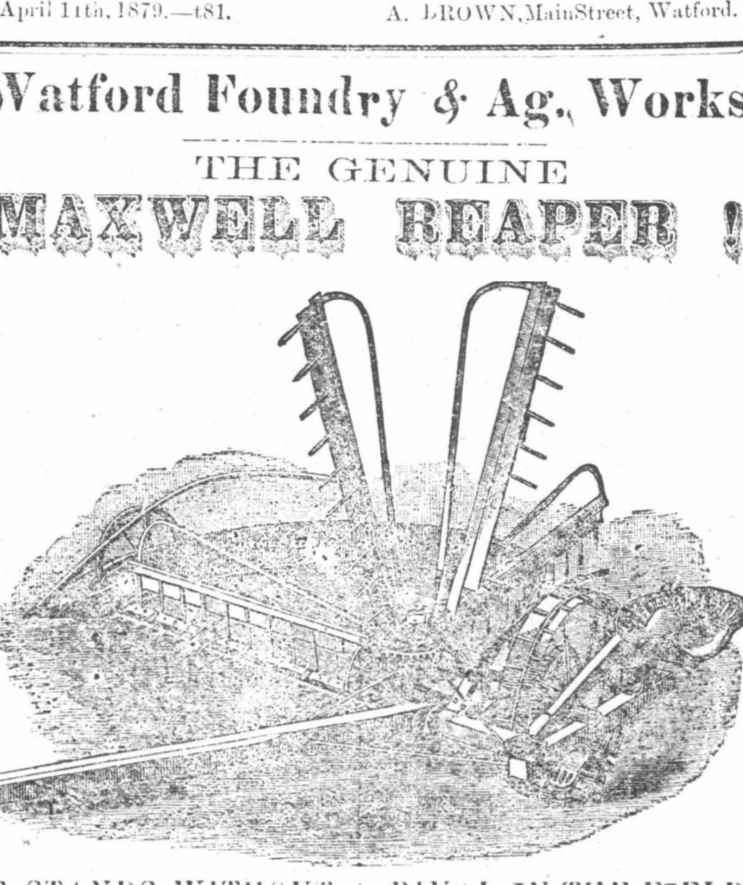
