### NOTE AND COMMENT

Theodore Roosevelt has been having the time of his life in the Canadian Rockies while on his way to the Panama Exposition. While visiting Banff he declared that it was the most beautiful spot he had ever visited with the exception of one, which was in South America and inaccessible. Theodore has a warm spot in his heart for the Allies. While at Vancouver he said he was proud of the showing Canadians had made in the way of helping Great Britain.

Heine, one of the greatest of the pre-war Germans, said there was only one thing greater than a German's envy; his appetite. He might also have added his drinking capacity. Like the boa constrictor who swallows an ox whole and slowly digests it until its horns drop off, Germany has bitten off a huge chunk of Europe and is now attempting to assimilate it. A year has now been consumed in the process and the boa-constrictor among nations is beginning to show signs of acute indigestion.

It is no secret that lots of so-called Christian people get married with a firm determination to avoid the obligation which they owe to the state and the world in general. Race suicide is no less a crime because it is a sort of "respectable" one. It nearly provided France's undoing. The population of France only increased two million from 1861 to 1910, while during the same period the German Empire increased forty-six million. Such figures should prove illuminating at the present time.

### An Unprecedented Compliment

An unprecedented compliment was paid to the Dominion of Canada, or rather to the Overseas Dominions as represented by this country, when Sir Robert Borden was invited to take a seat at the meeting of the Imperial Cabinet last week. No constitutional change was involved in this delicate act of courtesy, for Sir Robert could not exert any influence upon the policy of the Cabinet without authorization from the people of Great Britain, and could not commit the Dominion of Canada to the support of any policy without being expressly authorized thereto by the people of Canada; he was present merely as a visitor, and doubtless his unimpeachable reputation for silence and discretion had as much to do with his invitation as his official capacity.

But the incident of last week draws its immense significance from the fact that it expresses a widespread feeling that the present organization of the Empire, with its complete insulation of the Overseas populations within the narrow bounds of their own local affairs and its concentration of all Imperial power in the hands of the people of the British Isles, is no longer possible or desirable. The same British Prime Minister who extended the hand of welcome to Sir Robert Borden last Wednesday is the man who only a few years ago talked of the utter impossibility of any sharing of the Imperial power of the British Parliament. Sir Robert himself a few years ago would hardly have ventured to consider any form of Imperial Federation as more than a remote and pleasant dream. There can have been few, among those who read of Sir Robert Borden's presence at the Cabinet Council as a guest, who did not in their mind's eye see him sitting there by right and custom, as the official representative of a great body of British subjects outside of Great Britain, alongside of that magnificent soldier and statesman Botha and the delegates of other Overseas Dominions—members, all of them, of the greatest governing body that the world has ever seen, a governing body with more power than the Senate of Rome possessed in its palmiest days.

At that Council of last week Sir Robert may have been a shadow and not a substance, a guest and not a lawgiver; but he was the shadow of a coming event, a guest soon to be adopted into the family.

### Germany Beaten and Bankrupt

Anyone with experience of the reckless gambler knows exactly the position in which the head of the Prussian militarist party now finds himself. He has involved his financial backers so deeply that they are against their will, partners in his gamble. He told them the war would be over last October. The capture of Paris was a certainty, and Russia could be dealt with at his convenience, when that end was achieved. He borrowed heavily, but their confidence, and they are obviously getting nervous.

It is entirely possible that the war may be over in October, but the Kaiser will have nothing to say about its duration or conclusion. Germany was beaten when she failed to capture Paris in the first rush. She is not merely beaten, but bankrupt, now. What the German bankers are fighting for is a successful receivership. They know well enough that even this will be impossible with another winter of war.

The foreign exchange market has gone, and, only this reason, the value of the paper mark is what they choose to call it. In another six months it will rank a little above the Confederate shipplaster for purposes of world trade.

Here is a tremendous speculative transaction, which has failed. In Wall Street a clique of immature speculators once advanced an industrial stock from 40 to 165, and found that they had more of it at the top than at the bottom. The public, which was expected to buy, unloaded on the way up. The ring sold out at an average of 35, and since then the property has been admirably managed, mainly because its directors have stayed out of the stock market.

This is the parallel to the Kaiser's gamble. If the German bankers hope to save anything out of the wreck, they will stop him now, and liquidate what few assets remain.



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POTATOES ROTTING IN THE FIELD

Circular From O. A. C.

During the last few days we have received from various districts in the province of Ontario samples of diseased young potato vines, with requests for information regarding the nature, cause and cure of the disease. We had previously noticed the same disease among the potato crops both on experimental grounds and in the general crop of potatoes on the College farm. The disease appears to be fairly widespread this season, we have deemed advisable to issue a circular letter respecting it.

In the growing crop an affected plant will have a wilted appearance, being dirty green in color, the stems flag and the leaves will have a tendency to curl. The stems near the ground and below will be blackened, and in the various stages of decay from a soft wet spot, digging out the seed potato, it will be found to be soft and pulpy, and, when broken open, the inside is usually soft and gives off an offensive odor.

This soft rot of potatoes is a bacterial disease. Its development in the growing crop is due to a chance to be carried by insects, but it is not spread, but as the soft rot develops as the potato grows, it enters the tuber rapidly. An affected seed potato which has been checked or blighted, will have a tendency to rot, and will be found to be soft and pulpy, and, when broken open, the inside is usually soft and gives off an offensive odor. This soft rot of potatoes is a bacterial disease. Its development in the growing crop is due to a chance to be carried by insects, but it is not spread, but as the soft rot develops as the potato grows, it enters the tuber rapidly. An affected seed potato which has been checked or blighted, will have a tendency to rot, and will be found to be soft and pulpy, and, when broken open, the inside is usually soft and gives off an offensive odor.

The crop should be carefully inspected and every plant that is found to be affected should be dug out and either buried or burned in quick lime. When harvesting the potatoes, the tubers should be placed on one side and allowed to be stored with the main crop. Should the disease not be far advanced in the tuber, the affected part may be cut off and the rest used for food. If any of these affected tubers get into the pile to be used the following year, it will either rot during storage and cause those around them to rot also if they are not kept dry, and if they are kept dry the disease will be checked until they are planted, when they will rot and destroy the plant that springs from them.
