FATAL ACCIDENT—We regret to learn that on Saturday last, while Mr. Mark Young, jr. was engaged in the Lathing Machine at Chamcook, sawing laths, one of the bolts of the saw became loose, flew off, and struck him in his left side with such force, as to leave him speechless for a short time. He was conveyed to his residence, and medical aid procured; but every exertion proved fruitless: he lingered in a state of great pain until Monday morning, when death relieved him of his sufferings. Mr. Young was an industrious, honest young man, and only in the twenty-eighth year of his age.

GREAT FIRE AT ALBANY.—We learn from our Boston papers, that an extensive conflagration took place in the City of Albany on Friday last, by which 500 houses, 100 canal boats, 10 000 barrels of flour, &c. were destroyed: loss estimated from 3 to 5 million dollars. It is also stated, that several emigrants were drowned in attempting to escape from the canal boats. Two schooners belonging to Boston were burnt.

We learn from the Boston Advertiser, that the steamer Admiral is to be laid up for six weeks, to have new wheels and other repairs.

DIED.

On Thursday morning, at his Father's residence, in the Parish of Portland, Henry George Clotter, aged 18 years, after a long and tedious illness which terminated in Consumption, and which he bore with Christian fortitude. He was the fourth son of Jacob Allan, Esquire.

At Digby, N.S. on Monday last, after a short illness, resulting from inflammation of the Bronchiae, the Rev. S. Bamford, known in these Provinces for the last 42 years, as a respectable and useful Minister of the Gospel in Wesleyan Church.

At Fredericton, on Tuesday last, Peter Fisher, Esq., aged 65 years, leaving a large family to lament their loss.

Swine, receiving premiums, must be kept one year for breed.

Persons must hand a List of Animals or other articles entered for competition, in writing, to the Secretary before 10 o'clock on the day of the Fair, and all persons not paid up Members of the Society must pay an entrance fee of five shillings.

Grain and Grass seeds to be exhibited on the 2d Tuesday in January next, at the Market House in St. Andrews.

No person shall receive more than one premium on the same kind of Cattle or other articles entered by him.
