In the absence of the Rural Dean,
Rev. W. Driffield, Rector of Digby,
who was absent through illness, the

C. Mellor, "Jesus the Revelation of
the Father—Gospel of St. John" by
the Rev. A. W. L. Smith.

ed by the Rev. M. Taylor. Another

Parrsboro, N. S.—Caught in the re-
