SENTENCED TO HANG

Alfred Arsenault, 18, to Pay Death
Penalty For Slaying Aged Man.

St. Andrews, N. B.—Alfred Arsen-
ault, aged 18, was today sentenced
by Judge Byrne to be hanged on Jan-
uary 1st, for the murder of Alpheus
Hanselpecker.

Hanselpecker, aged 70, a store-
keeper at Bethel, near St. George,
N. B., was found beaten to death in
his yard on May 8th, last. A beech
club, bloodstained lay nearby. The
store had been robbed.

Arsenault, who belongs to Mon-
ton, N. B., was arrested. He was
tramping towards the United States
border. Evidence was given by 35
witnesses for the Crown. The de-
fence did not call any witnesses. E.
R. MacDonald, of Shediac, counsel
for the prisoner, said after the ver-
dict of guilty was brought in, that
he would apply for a new trial.

The murdered man some twenty or
more years ago was a resident of
Tiverton, Digby County, and for a
considerable time carried on a meat
business through Long and Brier
Islands.
