Severa! months passed befor the animal was eatirely uncovered, and it periectly had nature preserved It, tha it was then cut up and the fiesh given to the dogs.
The news of this alscovery passed from aative to native, and from town to town, untll it reached the ears of a Govern for the preservation of the carcass but the flesh hed alresdy been destroyed Only its head and feet remalned, which are now preserved in one of the great museums of Russia-St. Nicholas.

## GILBERT IBLAND WARRIORS.

The Gilbert Islands lle on both sides 180th meridion They are beyond tas number, with a thin soll, scanty rainiall, and 'imited vegciation. The cocoanutpalm thrives here as well as the pandanus, or screw-plae; but almos nothing else which can furnish food fo human beings. Advocates of a meagr alet, as conducive to health, might do well to emigrate to the Gilbert Islands if they survive the experiment, their estimony will be interesting; possibly, however, a little "thin." The samo language is spoken on all of these Islands. The people are naturally hardy, savige, and quarrelsome. They wear quently seen entirely and men are ire of the men are naked. The bodles

Frequently they wers billged, in self-preservating, to nee for a season to a more salubrlous cilme untll, at last, utterly broken in health they were compelled to take un the residence in Honolulu, where they atil continuo thelr labours of lovo among Gllbert Islanders who have been broust to Hawall as labourers. The days o martyrs and heroes of falth are not yet past.
