728-LADIES' TAILOR SHIRT WAIST. 32, 34, 36, 38, 40 and 42 inch bust. Made of fine French flannel, use appropriate fabric for this mode, the machine stitching on the back providing a strictly tail for finish. The double hem is front through which the closing is effected with buttons and buttonholes, covered by a band of ribbon or velvet. The front turning tucks at either side form a vest effect, and are slightly raised over the narrow velvet girdle.



729-GIRLS' GORED SKIRT WITH GATHERED OR DOUBLE BOX PLAIT BACK. 6, 8, 10 and 12 years. Yellow and white organdy was chosen for this dainty little skirt with Valenciennes lace and insertion for trimming. Lawn, dimity or nainsook may be developed in this style with lace, ribbon or a light trimming. If made with cut the ruffle and box plaited in the back it is an appropriate model for dimity, henricette, cheviot or challis.



730-MISSES' BOX PLAITED SKIRT WITH APRON OVER SKIRT. 12, 14 and 16 years. Light weight and summer fabrics lend themselves gracefully to the new flounce skirts, which are much more appropriate for this purpose than the close fitting models worn last summer.



731-LADIES' TUCKED SKIRT. 22, 24, 26, 28 and 30 inch waist. Soft clinging fabrics such as crepe de chine, lansdowne, foulard and panne finish the skirt or dainty organdy, lawn and silk muslin lend themselves gracefully to the innumerable new models for tucked and plaited skirts.



732-LADIES' SHIRT WAIST WITH SHIRT COLLAR. 32, 34, 36, 38, 40 and 42 inch bust. May dainty white waists are shown for dressy occasions, made of all-over valenciennes lace, inserted looking to the lace and having fine dimities and lawns with lace stripes and other delicate finishing touches. This shirt waist is made on a close fitting lining of white lawn. This model may also be used for jersey, madras, cotton, velvet or percale, and made without a lining.



733-LADIES' SHIRT WAIST. 32, 34, 36, 38, 40 and 42 inch bust. Many dainty white waists are shown for dressy occasions, made of all-over valenciennes lace, inserted looking to the lace and having fine dimities and lawns with lace stripes and other delicate finishing touches. 734-GIRLS' DRESS. 6, 8, 10 and 12 years. Pale blue and white foulard is here daintily trimmed with fine Valenciennes lace and tucked blue chiffon. The bodice, which follows the yoke, is of unique scalloped shaping, edged with lace and narrow insertion. The full skirt is gathered and attached to the body under the belt. It is finished with a hem at the lower edge, machine stitched silk, challis, French flannel or crepe made in this style may be trimmed with velvet, silk, ribbon or lace. It may also be developed in lawn, dimity, nainsook or fine gingham, with a bertha of plique or linen, cut high or low neck and trimmed with lace or embroidery.



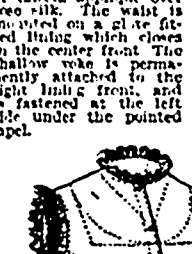
735-MISSES' TUCKED SKIRT. 12, 14 and 16 years. A fashionable skirt in Russian green light weight cloth, shaped with circular front and a graceful, box plaited back. The plait is backward turning forming a single box plait in the center front. They are quite shallow at the belt and deepen toward the lower edge.



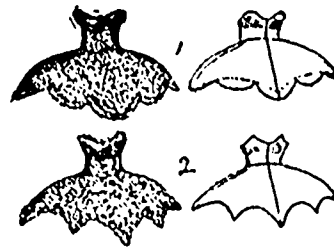

This stylish waist is made of cream colored India silk, the decoration consisting of shaped bands of plain turquoise blue to match the figure in the skirt. Waists of this kind may be made of percale, dimity, lawn, plique, linen or French flannel. The bands may be of the same color as the waist or a contrasting shade.



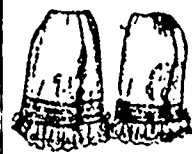
737-GIRLS' TUCKED COSTUME. 6, 8, 10 and 12 years. Stylish costumes of this mode may be developed in lawn, silk, crepe or French flannel. Venetian, polka, crepe and other light weight fabric with trimming of ribbon, silk, velvet or lace.



738-LADIES' CORSET COVER. 32, 34, 36, 38, 40, 42 and 44 inch bust. Perfect fitting waists in this style are desirable for stout figures, and should always be worn under plain tailor-made gowns, wrinkles from a full undergarment being apt to show.

740-LADIES' PAIR FITTED DRAWERS. 22, 24, 26, 28, 30 and 32 inch waist.



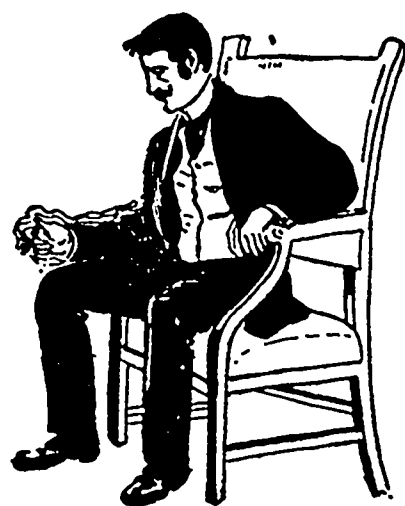
741-INFANTS' DRESS. One size only.



742-LADIES' BLOUSE WAIST WITH SHIRT COLLAR. 32, 34, 36, 38, 40 and 42 inch bust. May be made up in summer fabrics, percale, madras, lawn, lawn, cotton, cheviot and has revised collars without lining the shoulder or buttoned under the collar.

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Mending Granite and Agate Ware. These utensils cannot be easily soldered like ordinary tinware, but can be mended in two ways. Take a piece of lead and cut it with a sharp knife, sharpening it as one would a pen. Put the small end of the lead through the hole, then place the utensil on the edge of the stove and hit it several

hard blows with a hammer, until the lead is flat and smooth on both sides. Or, take a copper rivet of the required size, place the small end in the hole and pound it flat. The lead does well enough when the utensil is to be used only on top of the stove, but the copper rivet is all right for any use.—[Marian Meade.]
