CANADA-U.S. TRADE AGREEMENT—REPRESENTATIONS BY GOVERNMENT TO UNITED STATES GOVERNMENT

Motion No. 199-Mr. Lawrence:

That an Order of the House do issue for copies of all notes and formal representations made by, or on behalf of, the Government of Canada to the Government of the United States of America with respect to negotiating revisions to the Canada-U.S. Automotive Trade Agreement.

Reid (Parliamentary Secretary to President of the Privy Council): Mr. Speaker, no written representations have been made to the United States government in respect of the operation of the Canada-United States automotive trade agreement and the possibility of revisions to this agreement. However, these matters have been the subject of numerous discussions with senior United States officials who thus are fully aware of Canadian views. I would therefore ask the hon. member to withdraw his motion.

EFFECTIVENESS OF PRESENT STRATEGY IN REDUCING UNEMPLOYMENT IN LIGHT OF REPORTED GOVERNMENT INTENTION TO PROVIDE WORK FOR EMPLOYABLES ON WELFARE

Hon. John N. Turner (Minister of Finance): Mr. Speaker, I think the hon. gentleman is basing that question on a press report, and he ought to wait and see the policy announced by my colleague.

Mr. Stanfield: Is it now the policy of the minister to attempt to reduce unemployment by creating a sort of huge LIP style program, does the government believe this is necessary in view of interest rates going up, and will the government accept the proposition that its policies will not create sufficient jobs in the private sector?

Mr. Turner (Ottawa-Carleton): The answer is no, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Stanfield: Mr. Speaker, I should like to ask the Minister of Finance whether he has been consulted about the work program proposal of the Minister of National Health and Welfare?

Mr. Turner (Ottawa-Carleton): The government is constantly in touch, Mr. Speaker.
