**Mr. Speaker:** Order, order, order, please. The Chair is in a difficulty because the same problem is now raised here where questions are being asked about legislation that is not yet before the House. Either it is anticipation or it is hypothetical. Order, please.

**Mr. Frith:** Mr. Speaker, twenty-four hours after the U.S. Trade Commission has hammered the Canadian softwood industry, does the Prime Minister consider it wise that his Government would table legislation in this House that is going to increase patent life for the American multinational drug companies, and how is that move going to improve our bargaining position by this type of giveaway?

**Right Hon. Brian Mulroney (Prime Minister):** Mr. Speaker, the last lesson that anyone needs on anything in terms of skill is from the Liberal Party, and from this particular Member. We saw, when the Leader of the Opposition was Minister of Finance, spending rose 23 per cent a year, the debt grew by 50 per cent, and debt service grew by 85 per cent. It was a result of those skills that he brought to bear that the country almost went belly up. That is the problem with the little Liberal attitude. Ours is progressive. We believe in international trade, competitiveness, increased productivity, and 600,000 new jobs already in Canada.
