VIOLENCE

This innovative network of centres, funded equally by Health and Welfare Canada and the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council, will see the creation of new partnerships among front-line workers, community groups and researchers.

The successful centres chosen by an arm's length committee will be based at the University of New Brunswick, the University of Western Ontario, the University of British Columbia, the University of Manitoba and l'Université de Montréal in conjunction with Laval University in Quebec City.

THE ECONOMY

Hon. Chas. L. Caccia (Davenport): Mr. Speaker, each day the economic forecasts of this government are proven wrong. Each day the pace of plant closures quickens, the line of unemployed grows and the despair of ordinary Canadians deepens.
