GOVERNORS HOLD DIVIDED OPINIONS

Appointment of Dean for Varsity Women's Residence Presents Problem.

WANT TORONTO GRAD. Section of Board Objects to Oxford Candidate Getting the Post.

The appointment of a dean for the women's residence of Queen's Hall at Toronto University, which will come up before the board of governors at their meeting on Thursday afternoon, has caused a difference of opinion which is likely to furnish a discussion.

One objection favors the appointment of Miss Wrong, the eldest daughter of Prof. George M. Wrong of the modern history department, but objections are offered by another party of the board of governors, who object that a more satisfactory appointment could be made.

The objections are offered on two grounds: That Miss Wrong is not old enough to hold a position such as head of the women's residence of the university, which they are satisfied demands a woman with a wide range of experience who is considerably older than the girl students who come under her care.

Another objection is that Miss Wrong is not a graduate of Toronto University, as she went to Oxford to complete her education. One prominent university man expressed himself. Toronto has been turning out women graduates since the education scheme was first introduced over thirty years ago, and that if it was found that Toronto University had not produced a suitable graduate for such a position, applicants should be sought elsewhere.

Considerable feeling has been developed over the situation. Decision will probably be made at Thursday meeting in the matter. Opinion is divided, and with several other applicants for the appointment, the question will be resolved into a contest for the largest number of votes.

Principal Hutson who has asked about the matter said that there were several applicants, and that he could say nothing about the situation, considered by the board of governors.
