## LEAFS NOSED OUT DUNN'S ORIOLES

Darkness Stopped the Game  
With Our Boys One Run  
to the Good.

RICHMOND, Sept. 3.—Toronto took the first game of the final series from Richmond this afternoon, 6 to 5, the game being terminated after the seventh inning by darkness.

Toronto waited until the third to start the scoring, a perfect peg home by Thompson having cut Koecher off at the plate in the second after he doubled and tried to score on Ball's single. With two down in the third Gilbert, Daley and Graham singled in succession, leading the Leafs to a 3-0 lead.

Koecher gathered an infield pop, scoring Gilbert, and Carroll walked to force Daley across on Ball's single with the bases choked.

After McTigue had rolled out to Mulien in the fourth, Williams singled to right and Rath singled thru short. Gilbert hit to two, Williams scoring. Daley singled to right, scoring Rath, and both Gilbert and Daley crossed on Graham's triple to right. Koecher hit safely for the third time and Healey was sent to the box to relieve Morrisette. Carroll filed to left and Ball again fanned, leaving Graham and Koecher stranded.

McTigue fanned the side in order in the second, Richmond's first scores crossing in the fourth, when two singles and a pass loaded the bases with none out.

Daley's sacrifice fly scored Twombly and Mulien crossed Thompson's single to centre. Richmond punched hits, including a triple by Pick, scoring three runs in the fifth.

Darkness ended the game after the seventh, neither side being able to score further.
