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LOOKING BACK OVER LEAN BASEBALL YEAR

Major Leagues Lost Money in the Thousands—Detroit an Exception.

NEW YORK, Dec. 4.—There are a lot of people who are of the opinion that the owners of baseball franchises in the major leagues, especially the National and American Leagues, lost more money last year than they turned out of the United States mint.

There is no justification for such an opinion, nothing could be farther from the truth. There was a time when baseball was a good paying proposition, and that time may come again, but the last four years have been lean ones, and there will be more lean ones before there will be fat ones. There are more clubs losing money than declaring dividends.

The season of 1914 was a sad one; the 1915 season wasn't much better. The rush of the Braves last year, placed first in 1914 was the only thing that was a bright spot in the year.

This dash enabled every club to pick up more money than would ordinarily go into the coffers and awakened a lot of bottled up enthusiasm.

From an artistic standpoint the 1915 season of the National League was the best in its history. True, there have been closer finishes on one or two occasions, but never before have all eight clubs in the running for the pennant done so well in the last month of the season.

Four Clubs Made Money. Yet with this even race but four of the clubs made money. The Eastern League, the exception of the Chicago White Sox, the Detroit Tigers and the St. Louis Cardinals—lost money.

The Phillies cleaned up \$71,000 as their share of the world's series. Of this amount one-fourth must be deducted, for under the National League rules one-fourth of the world's series money goes to the other seven clubs in the league.

On the playing season the Phillies made about \$55,000. If the Phillies had played the same game in 1908 as they did this year, the club would have earned about \$20,000. That is the difference in the years and the enthusiasm. Five years ago such a race as was shown this year would have had the "bugs" dippy, but this year it only attracted the fans in spots.

On each one of their three western trips the Phillies did the club made enough money to pay the railroad fares and hotel bills—let alone salaries. The Phillies did well at home, but a lot of the profits of the games went to make up the deficit incurred in the games abroad.

The Phillies drew more people at home than any other club in the league. The League team ever did. They averaged 5,000 persons a day during the week and had some excellent Saturday crowds. On two occasions during the year they had more than 15,000 paid admissions and the seats were sold out once previous to the world's series. This never occurred before in the history of the club.

Out of the world's series receipts also the Phillies had to pay for special trains, which will further cut down the profits. The earnings will be trimmed to such an extent that no dividend will be declared this year. The reason for this is that the club lost heavily last season, and the profits of this year will go toward meeting the losses of last year and the net that must be met later.

run up to \$150,000. Besides the profits, the Giants collect \$50,000 each year from the New York American League Club for the use of the Polo Grounds. This makes a nice nest-egg.

The Braves cleaned up about \$20,000 on the year, including the world's series. This year the profits will reach about \$15,000, which isn't much on a million-dollar plant.

Brooklyn finished about \$30,000 ahead. This is the first time the regular season has produced a money-maker in five years.

Cubs will do well to break even on the season. The Cubs have completed a loss anywhere from \$20,000 to \$40,000 on the season. If it hadn't been for the profits of the club at different times during the year, the losses would have been enormous.

Things are not much different in the American League, if they are as good. The Johnstown club is the only one that has lost money in the last five years.

The Red Sox cleaned up about \$20,000 on the season, including the world's series, but when Lannin gets their playing salaries his profits won't be so good. He has the highest-priced club in the league.

Detroit made more money than any other club during the regular season. Navin and Yawkey's profits will reach \$25,000 on the season. The Tigers had their best year at home and abroad.

Comiskey in Chicago cleared about \$20,000 on the season. He is a loss because of the purchases of Jackson, Collins and others. He will be at least \$20,000 in the loss on the season.

The Giants cleared about \$50,000 on the playing season. This isn't a huge amount for the Giants, but it is fine for a tail-ender. Usually the Giants' profits have

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
