The Cheapest Telegrams.

The telegraph service of the Australian Commonwealth is the cheapest in the world, and is operated entirely by the government as part of the postal system. For city messages, which include a suburban area of a radius of ten miles beyond the city limits, the rate is 12 cents for messages of ten words, and the address; for messages of the same length to any point within the same state—and the states are generally very much larger than any American state—the charge is 18 cents, while for similar messages to any station within the Commonwealth—and from Rockhampton, in Queensland, to Perth, in West Australia, the distance of wire is more than 1,000 miles—the uniform charge is 24 cents. It is estimated that these rates will yield a net profit of fully \$18,000,000, that is, after paying operating expenses, cost of maintenance, and interest on capital expended in construction.—Montreal Gazette.

In the Dominion House on Monday in answer to Mr. Puttee, Hon. Jas. Sutherland, minister of public works, said that the contract for the construction of locks on Red River at St. Andrew's Man., was signed July 18, 1906, and the works are to be completed July 19, 1910. Burridge & Cooper, Winnipeg, have contracted to supply machine tools for the new Manitoba Iron Works, Ltd., at the value of about \$15,000.

The Northwestern Hide and Fur Co., of Minneapolis, report the following changes in the market on hides, wool, furs, etc. It will be noticed by looking over the revised prices that hides of all kinds are lower. 100 and sheep pelts are from 5 to 10 per cent lower. Skunk and mink furs are 20 per cent lower. The average receipts coming to market, now are considerably lower than last month.

The British Government has introduced its Irish Land-bill in parliament. It proposes that the government shall provide the money at a low rate of interest wherever the Irish farmers and peasantry may purchase from the landlords the farms from off which they derive their living.

This bill is expected to solve the long standing question of Irish land rights and to secure the peace of the British Isles. It has been favorably received in parliament.

Hide and Leather of Chicago reviews the hide market in that city as follows: Concessions were made which led to the sale of from five to ten thousand hides of the above selections to a western tanner. Buffs are held at \$4½, with 8c generally bid. One dealer says he was offered \$4½ for a car, but refused it. Receipts are very small. Dealers being well sold up on heavy stock are not anxious to sell at the bid price for buffs. Tanners, on the other hand are holding out of the market, believing prices will settle down still further unless a better demand springs up for leather. Calfkinks command full prices, but many of the tanners are well supplied and are talking an easier market.
