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game when they fall in with it, regardlefs of real wants, or the future confequences of the devaltation they make. On the 21st, they croffed the Snowbird Lake, and found deer as plentiful as before, fo that much time was expended in killing and caung them; but as Mr. Hearne was affured that the feafon would by no means premit them to proceed in a direct line to the Copper-Mine River, this delay was of little confequence.

In crofting Pike Lake, on the 3d of March, they came up to a large tent of northern Indians, who had been living there from the beginning of winter, and had employed that long interval in catching deer in a pound. Indeed fo fuccefsful is this method of sporting, in a country where the game is fo abundant, that many families subsist by it, without having occasion to move their tents above once or twice in the course of a whole winter.

Such an easy mode of prosuring subfistance in the winter months, is a capital bleffing to the aged and the infirm;
