ANALYTICAL METHOD

LEARNING LATIN AND FRENCH.

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By means of this method any person of average intelligence can acquire a practical knowledge of either Latin or French in three months, so as to fit himself for any of the ordinary examinations in these languages.

The system has nothing in common with any of the superficial *conversational* methods which have lately come into use. It embraces a vocabulary of 6,000 words, presenting these words in such a way that ten are almost as easily learned as one. It, moreover, acquaints the student with the manner in which words are formed, thus enabling him to form them for himself when his memory fails him.

The grammar of the language is taught analytically—from the language itself,—and the reasons (historical and logical) are given for the principles noted. In this way, French and Latin grammar, instead of being a mass of arbitrary rules, is made logical, consistent, and full of interest.

Every lesson contains conversational exercises, composed, not of sentences like, “*Have you seen my father’s old hat?*” but of natural idiomatic speech.

In the Latin lessons full directions are given for the reading of Latin in the Roman order, so that a Latin period can be understood without being reconstructed on the English model.
