to the Jesuits, appear in the published official inventory of the Jesuit possessions which was printed in 1824—it would seem that much of their personal belongings had been privately disposed of by gift or sale before 1801.¹

The portrait of Father Cazot is reproduced from a rare contemporary engraving by Violet, in the collection of the writer. That of Father Marquette is the only likeness existing with any presumption of genuineness, its history is given in the following extract :

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(Extract of Jesuit Relations and allied documents, edited by Reuben Gold Thwaites. Vol. LXXI—Page 400--an alleged portrait of Father Marquette):— "Father Jacques Marquette is not represented in the McNab² portraits because no likeness of that famous missionary was then known to exist. A letter of Father E. Mollet, then at Laon, France (the birth place of Marquette) to Father Felix Martin, dated Ang. 19, 1840, and preserved in the
