Wheat Takes a Little Spurt
The News is Mainly Bearish
Chicago Ignores Statistics and Prices Go Higher—Big Increase in Visible Supply and World's Shipments.

World Office.
 Monday Evening, Sept. 12.
 Liverpool wheat futures closed today 1/4 to 3/4 higher than Saturday; corn futures 1/4 lower.
 September wheat at Chicago closed 1/2 higher than on Saturday, September corn 1/4 higher, and September oats 1/2 higher.

October wheat at Winnipeg closed 1/2 higher than on Saturday, October oats 1/2 higher.
 Chicago car lots today: Wheat, 50; contract, 42. Corn, 35, 118. Oats, 106, 50.
 Winnipeg wheat receipts were 120 cars, against 219 a year ago (holiday a week ago).
 Northwest wheat receipts were 904 cars, against 253 a year ago.

Winnipeg Gradings
 Winnipeg wheat receipts today graded as follows: No. 1 northern, 104 cars; No. 2 northern, 104; No. 3 northern, 25; No. 4 northern, 3; rejected, 4 winter, 4.

Visible Supply.
 A comparison of the visible grain supplies in the United States to-day and on the corresponding dates of the past two years is as follows:
 Wheat, bu., 20,823,000, 17,725,000, 22,282,000.
 Corn, bu., 2,028,000, 1,847,000, 2,268,000.
 Oats, bu., 3,225,000, 3,435,000, 3,748,000.

Compared with a week ago, the visible wheat shows an increase of 1,848,000 bushels, an increase of 203,000 bushels, and an increase of 1,488,000 bushels.
 During the corresponding week last year wheat increased 1,848,000 bushels, and oats increased 1,488,000 bushels, and corn increased 1,488,000 bushels.

Corn Crops Late.
 U. S. Secretary of Agriculture Wilson confirms lateness of corn crop 50 per cent, made by Sept. 10, two-thirds of it corn, weather very important on immediate stock market.

Temperatures Below Normal.
 Snow says: Temperatures in north half of corn belt are running below normal, and low for maturing corn. Killing frosts have caught corn in parts of South Dakota and Minnesota, but delays in maturing crop in Northern Nebraska, Iowa and Illinois is the more serious feature.

Record World's Shipments.
 World's shipments, 17,650,000 bushels (inclusive up to Saturday night), against 15,740,000 bushels last week, and 3,000,000 a year ago.
 Total wheat taken by continent the past week, 15,740,000 bushels, against 1,500,000 a year ago.
 This week's shipments are record figures. On Nov. 15 last year the shipments were 17,650,000 bushels.

session, in spite of the press reports of damage to the crop in Texas over Sunday, and trading continued dull with prices slightly easier. Small shorts seem to have reduced their lines while the large interests, encouraged by the large receipts, sold freely, as did the south. The late news of the crop is growing more apparent and caution is the keynote, while the possibility of early frost remains. Receipts of new cotton should exert a depressing effect from time to time and we advised close adherence to the traders' position.
