## ONTARIO'S REVENUE

### BALANCED BY OUTLAY

Col. Matheson Exhibits Credit of \$3500—Important Works Drained Coffers.

Hon. Col. Matheson will stand on the solid ground of a well-balanced fiscal year when at an early date he delivers his budget speech to the Ontario Legislature. He will be able to show by the public accounts for the year ending Oct. 31, 1910, that so accurately were the estimates made that the current receipts and expenditure ran so close that the year ended with a credit balance of \$348,589.

The total receipts of the province amount to \$8,891,044.85, and the total expenditures \$8,542,455.06.

The bank balance at the beginning of the fiscal year totaled \$5,086,233.75. The other receipts of the year included: Subsidies from the Dominion totaled \$2,128,772.05; the department of lands, forests and mines contributed \$2,151,128.58; the department of education, \$44,076.20; the provincial secretary, \$24,109.36; game and fisheries, \$126,866.61; agriculture, \$122,088.69; under Supplementary Revenue Act, \$132,335.75; succession duties totaled \$373,730.96; licenses, \$359,162.43. The contribution of the T. & N. O. Railway to the provincial coffers this year was \$430,000.

The year was one of heavy special expenditures on account of the hydro-electric commission and to the T. & N. O. Railway. Payments totaling \$2,130,166.75 were made to the hydro-electric commission and an advance of \$350,000 was made to the provincial railway. Expenditure on civil government totaled \$55,877.36; on legislation, \$249,111.29; on administration of justice, \$559,147.74; education, \$1,060,274.41; public institutions, maintenance, \$1,076,042.35; colonization and immigration, \$75,195.57; agriculture, \$321,514.94; hospitals and charities, \$352,334.36; colonization roads, \$452,745.31; criminal investigations, \$270,551.

## POLICEMAN GOES TO JAIL

Stannard Pawned Watch He Found—Pleaded He Needed Money.

Policeman Walter Stannard was sent to jail for thirty days for theft by Magistrate Denison in police court yesterday morning.

Stannard pleaded guilty to the charge of theft. He had found a watch which had been stolen from a drunken man in a lane. Instead of turning it in as found property at the station, he had pawned it in York-street for \$2. Instead of his own name he used that of John Watson. The reason he gave was that he could not support his wife and family on his policeman's pay, so that the force has at least an argument in favor of an increase in pay from the fault of their erring member.

## DAMMING HUMBER WOULD MENACE BEAUTY PLANS

Civic Improvement Bodies Join City in Urging Government to Withhold Permission.

Opposition to the plans and design of the bridge which the Grand Trunk Railway proposes to build across the Humber River was recorded by the civic improvement committee and the Guild of Civic Art yesterday.

Sir William Ralph Meredith, chairman of the civic improvement committee, wrote to Mayor Geary and the council, strongly recommending "that immediate action should be taken to prevent the bridge of the Grand Trunk Railway Company being rebuilt in accordance with the plan which the company has apparently adopted."

He also urges "that steps be at once taken to ascertain whether the plan of the bridge has been approved by the governor-in-council, and the construction of it authorized by the Board of Railway Commissioners of Canada."

Part of Parks Scheme.

The reasons given are: "That in the development of civic improvements in the City of Toronto the River Humber and its banks will form a most important section of its parks and waterways, a section which, if rightly conserved, will be unsurpassed in natural beauty and use. Every foresight should be exercised to prevent any erection which should mar the approaches to the river, interfere with navigation, or cause blockades of ice and consequent flooding of its lower reaches. Such flooding would damage or destroy any park improvements carried out on the flats and low-lying portions of the river. The city council should take such immediate action to prevent any interference with the waterway as it now exists, and to endeavor to have any existing piers or other obstructions to the free flow of the water removed when reconstruction of the present bridges becomes necessary."

Plea for Time.

The Guild of Civic Art, in a resolution, endorses the application of the city council to the minister of railways, that they be heard before the plans of the proposed bridge across the Humber be approved, and it is urged in strongest terms that before the city appeals for the minister of railways or the railway commission the subject shall be carefully studied by the proper civic officials, including the parks commissioner, full consideration being given to the fact that the Humber River and its banks will form an important part of any park and driveway plan, and that the mouth of the river should be kept open, improved, not narrowed or obstructed unnecessarily, and the guild further recommends that the architectural features of a bridge at such an important point should receive due attention, having regard at the same time to the probable reconstruction at some future time of the present roadway and other bridges, in order that when completed the new bridge should harmonize and present an harmonious appearance, and add to the attractiveness of this portion of the city's parkway system.

## WANTS A SCRUTINY

Alleges Grave Irregularities in Local Option Vote.

KINGSTON, Jan. 27.—(Special).—T. J. Rigney, barrister, on behalf of F. R. Leslie of Hinchbrook Township, made application before Judge Price for a scrutiny of the ballots cast in the recent local option vote in that township. The petitioner testified that there had been grave irregularities in the casting of the ballots, and that the local option carried by five votes over the sixty per cent. required. Judge Price decided to hold a scrutiny of the ballots on Feb. 9.

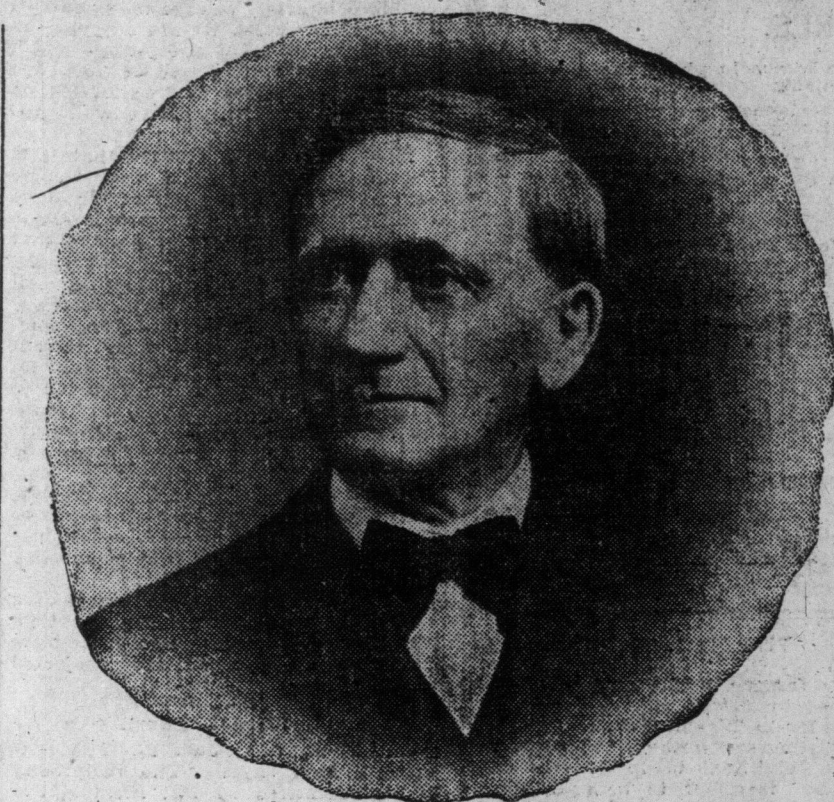

Leeds and Grenville Spent \$29,395 on Improvements.

BROCKVILLE, Jan. 27.—(Special).—At this afternoon's meeting of the county council the good roads commission presented a report covering the past year's operations. Roads and bridges rebuilt, entailed an outlay of \$29,395. The commissioners suggested that the council petition the minister of public works for Ontario for \$3708, being one-third of the total expenditure which is due the counties under the highway improvement act.

## ICEMAN IN MERRY MOOD

Report of Poor Cutting Weather Denied by Dealers.

"It's the best ice we've cut in twenty years," said Superintendent James Fairhead of the Lake Simcoe Ice Company, in answer to a query by The World last night. A report had circulated around the city that the mild weather was making trouble for the ice men, but Mr. Fairhead thought differently.

"The ice is from 15 to 17 inches thick," he continued, "and clear blue right to the surface. All our elevators are at least half full, which is unusual at this period of the year."

"How will that affect the price?" he was asked.

"Well, we are paying our men higher wages this year," he replied, "and that will counteract the good weather conditions so far as price goes. It will cost us just about the same. But you can say that prices won't be any higher, anyway."

## ALD. M'BRIDE TO PAY \$200

Jury Found Him Guilty of Slander—Ward Asked \$5000.

As a result of not controlling his Irish instincts at a council meeting and hurling an indignant "thief" and "robber" at the head of Wm. Ward of Ward's Island fame, Ald. Samuel McBride was ordered by the court to make restitution to the tune of \$200 yesterday.

Ward rented a piece of land on the island to a third party for \$25 a year, until the city came to the conclusion that the land was not his to rent, and then the trouble began. After some legislation Ward was forced to pay \$100 to the city, but on appeal, the city had to return the money. Mr. McBride objected to this, and as a result of what he considered a short weight on the scales of justice, overstepped himself, and said a little more than he intended. Ward brought suit for \$5000, but, although the jury agreed that it was malicious slander, they only awarded the \$200 to the injured man.

## Veteran Clergyman Dead.

THEFTOR, Jan. 27.—Rev. Hector Currie, for thirty-five years pastor of the Theftor and Ravenswood Presbyterian congregations, died suddenly yesterday of heart failure. He was born in Argyllshire, Scotland, in 1846, and came to Canada when a boy. Mr. Currie was moderator and secretary of the Sarnia Presbytery over twenty years.
