## COUNCIL UNANIMOUSLY FAVOR PARALLEL ROAD

York Township Agreement Meets  
With Approval—No Time Will Be  
Lost in Pushing Work.

NORTH TORONTO, Nov. 2.—(Special.)—The board of works at tonight's meeting ordered the formal signing of the agreement between the town and York township regarding the proposed roadway from Mount Pleasant Cemetery. The township council had a copy of the proposed agreement and the conditions imposed by the township.

They were in effect only such as were laid out by the township, and no variations, the outstanding feature being the payment of the \$15,000, as agreed upon between the township and the town, and after the completion of the road the township will maintain it in perpetuity. The township also agreed to assume the cost of all the work done by the township, and to assume the \$2000 and the maintenance of the highway.

This has already been understood, and as Councilor Muston said: "There is nothing to do but to go ahead and keep faith with the trust, and the township, and this will be done, and that right shortly." The township will be made to keep the work within the \$20,000 voted by the ratepayers. Once they decided upon it there will be no time lost and tenders for excavating will appear at once. The work, as stated by the mayor, can be carried out better now than at any other time, and there will likely be no serious trouble from frost much before Christmas.

In addition to the bridge over the old belt line another bridge or driveway will be constructed immediately to the south of that in order to give the cemetery people access by way of the north side, but side will be a very expensive affair. There was no suggestion on the part of the township in favor of a new road to the cemetery, but the township is in a position to do so if the township council so desire. ## TORONTO FIRM LOWEST TENDERER FOR TUBES

M. J. Haney & Co. Ask \$2,600,000  
For Concrete Subway—Two  
Millions More Needed.

A local contracting concern, M. J. Haney & Co., are the lowest tenderers for the construction of the three miles of tube system at present proposed. Their tender is \$2,600,000, as shown by the principal tenders.

The contract calls for only the excavation and the construction of the stations and the necessary concrete platforms, walls and ceilings. The work of installing the rails and the completion of the stations will be a separate contract. Cars must also be purchased.

The city's engineers expect that it will cost \$4,500,000 to put the whole system in operation. The bylaw to be submitted to the ratepayers on election day will most likely be for this amount.

The principal tenders follow: Pearson & Co., New York, \$3,500,000; Patrick McGovern, Boston, \$3,200,000; Coleman Bros., Boston, \$3,100,000; Nawn Contracting Co., Boston, \$3,000,000; E. J. Smith & Co., New York, \$2,800,000; Larkin & Sangster, St. Catharines, \$2,700,000; James Stewart & Co., New York, \$2,600,000; F. L. Cranforth, Brooklyn, \$2,500,000; M. J. Haney & Co., Toronto, \$2,400,000.

It will be seen that there is a wide divergence between the highest and lowest tenders. That of Haney & Co. is practically half that of Pearson & Co.

The tenders varied their prices for the different sections, the lowest one bidding the lowest price for sections A and B, \$3.80 per yard; sections C and D, \$2.50 per yard; E and F, \$2 per yard; G and H, \$1.75 per yard; I and J, \$1.50 per yard; K and L, \$1.25 per yard, and \$1.00 for concrete work through out, while another, the highest tenderer, bid \$12.75 per cubic yard for concrete, and excavation at \$5.50 and \$4 per yard.

It is understood that the extension of time required by the English company, which wished to tender on the tubes, wasn't so much for the purpose of putting in figures as to get different specifications. This, of course, would have involved a re-letting of contracts, creating a delay, which was out of the question under the circumstances.

## M'NAMARA JURY MAY BE COMPLETE TO-NIGHT

Ten Men of Two Hundred and  
Seven Challenged Have Passed  
Test of the Challengers.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Nov. 2.—Barring one man, the third venire of prospective jurors was exhausted at the close of court to-night in the McNamara murder case. Altogether 207 veniremen have been drawn. Of these ten men were challenged, and seven have been accepted as to cause by both sides, in which no talesmen was passed.

Counsel for both prosecution and defence in the trial of James B. McNamara renewed predictions that the entire twelve venire might be exhausted by to-morrow night if there were no hitch in getting more veniremen to examine.

The newcomer is M. T. McNulty, a retired tailor. He is still subject to peremptory challenge if the state or the defence should desire to exercise it. It was considered unlikely to-night that the defence so desired.

Byron Lusk, under examination when court adjourned, seemed to meet the approval of the defence. He and H. B. Plenkner were the only two in the box not accepted as to cause, and the defence question to ask Lusk.

## CONDITION OF SCHOOLS IS ROUNDLY CONDEMNED

Trustee Lewis Stirs Up Merry Row  
at the Board of Education Meeting.

The perfunctory droning of "carried over" and "what's the pleasure of the committee," etc., of Chairman Leves of the board of education was brought to an abrupt ending last night, when Trustee Lewis presented a motion to appoint a competent sanitary engineer, whose duties were to have charge of the plumbing, ventilation and general sanitation of the public high schools and colleges of Toronto.

The attention of the members was called by Trustee Lewis to the fact that nothing had been done until recently with regard to his request of March 4 last, to subject the schools to a smoke test, in order that the sanitary condition of the buildings might be ascertained. He said sixteen schools have occurred the board of education would have been able to a law-suit.

With the backing up of the sewer in the Parkdale school, Trustee Lewis said in each case either diphtheria or scarlet fever had broken out, and the parents were getting their children transferred when possible. He cited one case after another, showing the health of the children. And further, he said the members of the board could not now say they were not informed of the matter, and a delay in correcting the evil would be nothing short of a crime.

A general discussion of the matter followed, after which Superintendent of Buildings Bishop was given the privilege of defending his department. He did, to the extent of contradicting statements of Trustee Lewis, and finally wound up by saying it would be a shame for the board to go out and broadcast to the people.

A vote was taken on the motion that a sanitary engineer be appointed, the result being six for the motion and five against.

Chairman Leves declared the motion lost. Mr. Lewis appealed from the decision of the chair and cited the bylaw for his action. The question was put and the chair was sustained.

Those voting for the motion were: Brown, Conboy, Fairbairn, Hillz, Leves and Noble.

Those voting against were: Boland, Dineen, Ellis, Leves and McKay.

When the question of placing scales in each of the public schools was brought up, Trustee Noble declared himself opposed to it as a useless expenditure of money.

Chairman Leves said it was alright. Whereupon Trustee Noble said: "If you say it is alright, you have been slandering things here to-night and making wrong rulings, but I want to know what the board of education have to say about it." Mr. Leves replied by declaring it carried.
