# TANK "BRITANNIA" ON PARADE TODAY

Battle-Scarred Machine and Its Crew Help Sell Bonds.

One of the two big features of the Victory Loan campaign is the visit of CARTER—At Toronto, on Tuesday. Oct the tank "Britannia." by the special consent of United States Secretary of War Baker. The tank arrived in Toronto yesterday, and will be on parade thru the streets of the city this morn-The tank is in charge of Capt. Haigh, M.C., and a crew of seven men. For the past year it has been on ser-vice in the United States, and is credited with the sale of hundreds of

usands of Liberty Bonds. Capt. Haigh, when seen last night "this is the only tank on the American continent that has been in action, and remains in service." He said that the tank went thru three charges in the battle of Arras, and while it escaped being knocked out of action by German artillery, it could show the scars of rifle fire. United States it has traveled 25,000 It weighs 30 tons, is 26 feet long, and is equipped with one 250 horsepower engine. From six to eight gallons of gasoline are required to propel it a mile. The "Britannia" is equipped with six machine guns and has storage capacity for 30,000 rounds of small arm amm


