NEW YORK, May 5 .- Two long lines of men and women-probably 20,000 of them-trailed in parade form thru the streets of the upper and lower east side late Saturday, to demonstrate their sympathy for Moyer, Haywood and Petti bone of the Western Federation of Min ers, whose trial on the charge of killing ex-Gov. Steunenberg of Idaho will begin next Thursday at Boise.

Merging subsequently into a huge crowd at 40th-street and Lexington-ave nue, 2000 or 3000 of the paraders man aged to crowd into the Grand Central Palace to wind up the demonstration in one of the biggest union labor and so cialistic demonstrations seen in New York for a long time, No disorderly demonstrations of any

ort marked the progress of the march-ng lines. The first real enthusiasm came after the crowd had entered the hall, when a fife and drum corps start ed the thrilling strains of the "Mar-seillaise." The crowd cheered and scores waved small red flags.
