# BAPTIST YOUNG PEOPLE.

Annual Meeting of the Union in Immanuel Church - Officers Were Elected.

The annual meeeting of the Baptist Young People's Union was held in Immanu-ei Church last evening, there being a very

el Church last evening, there being a very large attendance. The proceedings were opened with musical and devotional exercises. The roll call followed, and this was a unique and picturesque ceremony, each union, as its name was called, responding by the members rising in their seats and singing a verse of a chosen hymn or reciting a Rible text.

President F. M. Moffatt then read his namual report, which reviewed carefully the work done during the past year. Progress was noted on the part of most of the unions. The reports indicated earnest work and interest well sustained. He declared himself strongly in favor of sociability among the members of the unions, but was opposed to having mere entertainment develop into the leading characteristic, which would lower the spiritual standard. The Chicago course of Bible study was recommended for the next season's work. The treasury was reported to be solvent, with a slight balance on hand. In conclusion the president gave it as his opinion that the Young People's movement had not yet run its course mor fulfilled its purpose.

Rev, John G. Brown, foreign mission sectedary, addressed the meeting on "A Plea For Forward Movement in Missions," advocating a more aggressive campaign. He membaded his hearers that Baptist missions had been singularly blessed. A Baptist, William Carey, was the first foreign missionary, and foreign converts to the Baptist faith outnumbered those of any other denomination by thousands. A spiritual lethargy had, he believed, prevailed for the past five or ten years, and this was due, in his opinion, to two causes—skepticism and higher criticism. The way to kill these giant evils was not to preach against them, but to the preach the good old story of Jesus Christ. The only country in the world, so far as he knew, that was closed to Christian missionaries, was Thibet.

#### PALACE HOTEL PROJECT. Aemilius Jarvis Says the Hotel Can Be Built Inside a Year-Option Extended.

The Palace Hotel project for Toronto seems to be assuming definite shape. The company's bill has been passed by the House of Commons, and the way is now clear for the financing of the enterprise. The directors of the company, which is capitalized at \$1,500,000, are; George Go. derham, president; Edward Guruey, Robert Jaffray, vice-presidents; Aemilius Jarvis, secretary; W. R. Brock, W. H. Bentty, Senator Forget, Duncan Coulson, Andrew S. Irving, A. E. Kemp, J. W. Langmuir, W. D. Matthews, J. Herbert Mason, E. B. Osier, M.P., B. E. Walker and Frederick Wyld, Aemilius Jarvis, who has been the chief promoter of the enterprise, says that all that remains to be done now is for the directors to secure the site, Options on the land have been extended, and Mr. Jarvis is confident that the Palace Hotel can be a practical reality inside of a year after ground is broken.

Several of the directors are out of town, and consequently a quorum could not be obtained yesterday, but it is believed rapid progress will be made once the directors get together.

Ministerial Association.

The last meeting of the Ministerial Association before the holidays was held yesterday morning, when the following resolutions were passed: (1) That a resolution of sympathy be extended to the family of the late Rev. J. E. Lanceley; (2) that sympathy and support be given to the convention of the Student Volunteer Movement which meets in Toronto in February and March of 1902; (3) that the association disapproves of the Canadian exhibit being on view on Sunday at the Paris Exhibition.
