Darting over the surface like an arrow, cleaving the waters with only the tip of her mast exposed, sinking like a plummet, rising like a cork at the will of her master, firing her torpedoes on the surface or ter, firing her torpedoes on the surface or submerged, under way or stationary; rolling along with a perfect imitation of the doiphin's movement, now on the surface and anon beneath it, and at intervals of from five to seven seconds only between the successive dives that marked her graceful undulations into and out of the depths; under each and every condition she performed her evolutions with beautiful accuracy that elicited nothing but admiration from the Norwegian naval expert.

The precess of complete submersion was accomplished in just eight seconds. Running on down the course for three minites, she now let go her Whitehead torpedo at three and a haif minutes past 10, while submerged to a depth of 10 feet and moving at a speed of five and a haif knots, This at a speed of five and a half knots. This was the first time the Fulton had fired a torpedo under these conditions during a public test, and the result was watched with the keenest interest by all on board

Six hundred yards the torpedo ran sabmerged. Then it came to the surface directly in the centre of the course. Most warships are more than twice as long as the distance between the buoyed flags marking the course. It looked as the it would have gone hard with anything atloat at which the Fulton might have directed her war missile with like accuracy.

Just ten seconds after the iron cetacean had fired its bolt she rose again to the surface, and at four minutes past 10 o'clock, half a minute after she had first fired, she had been brought to a dead stop, and was floating idly on the surface like a big marine mammal resting after some unusual rine mammal resting after some unusu-effort. In another minute the hinged cove of her conning tower was lifted, and Caj of her conning tower was lifted, and Cap tain Cable's head peeped out to watch the Kelpie as she steamed down the course past the Fulton to pick up the spent tor-pedo. Will Not Join in Hue and Cry Until Government Retracts Its Promise.

Despite the rain of last night, every available seat in Woodgreen Methodist Church was occupied, it having been announced that the pastor, Rev. A. B. Chambers, D.D., who is an out-and-out temperance advocate would deliver a stirring sermon on this burning question. The rev. gentleman said. that during the past 10 days the question of prohibition had proved most embarrass ing to the politicians, and had thrown con sternation into the Local Government. For years the prohibitionists had been clamoring for prohibition, and the plebiscite had endorsed that appeal, but now, when the prize was in sight, and nothing remained but provincial legislation upon the subject, they should ask themselves whether they had been serious in their desires. They had at the head of the Provin-



cial government a man who for years had been a total abstainer and an advocate of prohibition, and who in his official capacity had pledged himself to limit the traffic to the full extent permitted by Federal law.

"The enforcement of that pledge," he said, "is now before the country, and until the government takes back its pledge I shall not join in any hue and cry raised by efther Grit or Tory as to whether the government has been serious in its promises, or whether for years it has been living on the guilibility of the temperance people. 
