LABOR UNIONS WILL UNITE

And Form a Central Body Known as Toronto District Labor Council.

WILL KEEP TAB ON THE ALDERMEN

Report Disapproving of Those Who Opposed Reopening of the Gas Question.

At the meeting of the Trades and Labor Council last night in Richmond Hall, Delegate James Wilson announced that as a result of several conferences the amalgamation of the City Labor Councils would be consummated on July 1. The bodies to be amalgamated are the Trades and Labor Council, Federated Building Trades Council, Metal Trades Council, Amalgamated Wood Workers' Council and the Allied Printing Trades Council.

In the report of the Municipal Committee it was suggested that a system be adopted whereby a record be kept of the conduct of the members of the City Council, particularly on labor questions. The report took to task those members of the City Council who opposed the reopening of the gas question. The proposition to appoint a city architect was also opposed.
