GATLING GUNS

MAKE PEACE

All Quiet at Virden—Large Force of Troops at the Scene of Wednesday's Conflict—Not a Local Miner Killed.

Virden, Ill., Oct. 13.—The town is quiet today. Two Gatling guns of the Galesburg Battery on the public square, and a blue-caped infantryman at each corner in the business district are about the only evidence of yesterday's riot outside of the O'Neill home, a story and a half cottage.

In the front yard of this home stand five black-covered coffins, on each of which there is a single plate engraved with the words "At rest." Under the lids are the remains of five of the victims of yesterday's battle at the stockade of the Chicago-Virden Coal Company's mine.

Coroner Hart has empaneled a jury and will endeavor to place the responsibility for the shooting.

Col. McKnight, of the governor's staff, accompanied by Adjutant Riess, at night visited the stockade of the Chicago-Virden Coal Company and served formal notice on Manager Luckens that the soldiers would visit the stockade today and disarm all the inmates. Col. McKnight expresses the opinion that there will be no further outbreak on the part of either the union miners or guards at the stockade.

Upon the arrival of the soldiers from Pana, two Gatling guns were taken to the public square, where they command the business section. Guards were thrown out, and the remainder of the soldiers were quartered in the opera house.

There is feeling among the people of the town who are not connected with the mines that the Virden miners are not responsible for yesterday's tragedy. A striking incident is the fact that in yesterday's bloody work not a single Virden miner was killed, and only one slightly injured.

After a careful investigation the list of dead and wounded remains at 10 killed and 20 wounded.

Is Not Going to Be Remodeled Just Now.

Mashud Waziris Make a Raid, But Skedaddle Before the Troopers—Russian Barbarity.

London, Oct. 13.—Lord Salisbury has written to the parliamentary committee of the Cardiff corporation with reference to the proposal
