Virden, Ill., Oct. 13.-The town is quiet today. Two Gatling guns of the Galesburg Battery on the public square, and a blue-caped infantryman at each corner in the business district is about the only evidence of yesterday's riot outside of the O'Neill home. a story and a half cottage.

In the front yard of this home stand five black-covered coffins, on each of which there is a single plate engraved with the words "At rest." Under the lids are the remains of five of the victims of yesterday's battle at the stockade of the Chicago-Virden Coal Company's mine.

## THE OLD FLAG

Is Not Going to Be Remodeled Just Now.

Mashud Waziris Make a Raid, But Skedaddle Before the Troopers-Russian Barbarity.

London, Oct. 13.-Lord Salisbury has written to the parliamentary committee of the Cardiff corporation with reference to the proposal that the arms of Wales should be included in the royal standard. His lordship points out that the proposal is a novel one, and he does not feel that the present moment is opportune for introducing so important an alteration into the arms of the royal standard, which were established at the time of her majesty's coronation by order in council. He fears there would be considerable objections, both constitutional and heraldic, which would militate against her majesty's approval of the proposed change.

WAZIRIS ON THE WARPATH. A telegram from Simla, India, says: A small party of Mashud Waziris suddenly descended from their hills and raided villages near Jandola. Coming across a levy post, the Waziris opened fire, and killed one of our men and wounded two others. The noise of the firing brought a cavalry escort upon the scene, and the troopers were received with a volley, but without sustaining any harm. The raiders then bolted back towards their own country. They are now being hotly pursued by cavalry and infantry from Jandola. Gen. Egerton has summoned a great gathering of the Afridis at a great gathering of the Afridis at Peshawur on Oct. 24, at which the terms of the Indian Government in respect to the custody of the passes will be announced.

RUSSIAN BARBARITY. A shocking incident in Siberian prison life is reported from the settlement of Zherdovka, in the Lena district. An officer named Posherba, in charge of a newly-arrived gang of convicts, developed symptoms of insanity. He tortured the unfortunate prisoners, and finally refused to give them their rations. A murmur of revolt arose from the wretched gang. Calling the guard out. Posherba ordered it to fire a volley at the starving exiles, several of whom fell dead at the first discharge. PRUSSIA AND THE VATICAN. London, Oct. 13.-The Rome correspondent of the Daily Mail persists in his assertion that diplomatic relations between Prussia and the Vatican have actually been broken off, and that Cardinal Rampolla is making frantic efforts to repair the error.

CHIEF SAMORY CAPTURED. Paris, Oct. 13.-According to a dispatch from St. Louis, capital of French Senegambia, it is reported there that Samory is a West African chieftain. who for nearly thirteen years has been the most dangerous antagonist the Europeans have had to deal with. After ten years of guerilla warfare he was driven out of the Soudan, but he then made a swoop upon the fertile region of Kong, a dependency of the French coast. Since then Samory has been repeatedly heard from. At the time of the war between the British and Ashantis it was reported that he intended joining King Prempeh against the latter's enemies; but this he did not do. About two years ago the French Government decided to send a punitive expedition against him, after he had surprised and routed a detachment of French troops sent to occupy territory which it is said he had offered to evacuate. Last winter the French occupied Odienne and Sambatigilla. Since then a desultory warfare has been carried on against

Advices received from Seoul, the capital of Corea, state that Kim Hong Niuk and two other men, said to have been engaged in the conspiracy to poison the emperor, were hanged in prison on Oct. 1. Their bodies were afterward mutilated by a mob. The wife of Kim Hong Niuk has been sentenced to three years' imprisonment and to receive 100 lashes.

Mme. Albani, the prima donna, will go to Balmoral on Oct. 29 to pay a brief visit to the Queen.

The number of men in Paris returning to work was greatly increased this morning, and the meeting of the strikers was poorly attended. In fact, the strike of the laborers employed by the building trades is considered ended. A typhoid epidemic is just now raging in the eastern suburbs of London. The medical men report that the development of the disease is due to the milk from dairy farms, where many cases of typhoid have recently been discovered.

The Government of Morocco has paid to the Italian legation the sum of 150,-000 francs and to the Portuguese minister 200,000 francs as indemnity for the robberies of Italian and Portuguese subjects on the Rif coast.

Advices just received from Samoa say the German warship Bussard has brought Chief Mataafa and other exiles to Apia. Mataafa, it is added, promised to be loyal to the government, and to observe the Berlin convention. The kaiser will be received on his arrival in Jerusalem by a hundred Gerwhite and wearing white lilies.

In all the large cities of Germany there is a large sale of horse meat, especially to the poor. The horse but-chers now pay from \$25 to \$50 a head. Han Kiou Sol, Corean minister of justice, has been dismissed for permitting the brutalities perpetrated by the populace upon the body of Kim Hong Niuk and others who were hanged on Oct. 10, for having conspired against the emperor.

The Belgrade correspondent of the Kolnische Zeitung, reports a reign of coercion in Servia, the real head of the government, he says, being former King Milan, who is persecuting and arresting everybody that stands in his way.
