

TEAMSTERS ASKING \$11 A DAY, NOT \$13, AS WAS REPORTED

Representative Says Situation
Was Misrepresented On
Tuesday.

George Flood, secretary of the local Team Owners' Association, stated last night that the report in yesterday's paper recording a demand for increased pay made by a delegation of teamsters who appeared before a city council committee Tuesday night, gave a wrong impression of the situation. He asserted that the demand was for \$11 a day, not \$13 as reported, and that at present the pay was \$9.50 a day, not \$11, the amount mentioned in the report.

Mr. Flood said the teamsters last year asked the committee for an increase to \$12, and that the committee recommended to the council that they be paid \$11. The further progress of matters, he stated, was as follows: The council referred back the recommendation to the committee, which left the matter in the hands of the city engineer, and that official established a rate of \$9.50 a day.

Tuesday's delegation, said Mr. Flood, asked only that the previous recommendation for a rate of \$11 a day be put into effect. He added that unless this request were granted the teamsters certainly would have trouble getting teamsters this season.

CHANGE CONSTITUTION

T. and L. Council Revises Several
Clauses.

Various changes in the constitution occupied the Trades and Labor Council at its meeting in the Army and Navy Veterans' Hall, Wednesday night. No routine business was transacted, the meeting being especially called to revise the constitution.

It was decided to issue an up-to-date directory of all local affiliated unions, giving time and place of meeting, and to provide special admission and attendance cards for all delegates. Other changes require a vote in the council before locals can be expelled for non-payment of dues, the previous clause making their expulsion automatic after a certain period of time. In case of strikes or other hardships, financially stricken locals may continue in affiliation as long as the council sees fit. Another clause in the constitution requires that two-thirds of the council before funds of the organization can be used to promote or support a strike.

DOES LONDON WANT A SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA?

Each season the problem of providing orchestral music for London is becoming more serious. Suitable auditoriums are not available to make it a paying proposition to bring the large traveling symphony orchestras, and the Musical Art Society, which has given symphony concerts with its orchestra for the last four seasons, is faced with the same difficulty. Next Thursday evening, in the Masonic Temple, the orchestra of the society, augmented to seven players, by musicians from the Detroit and Toronto symphony orchestras, will provide a most interesting program, at which Mr. Vilgo Kuhl, the distinguished Danish pianist, will be the soloist.

Owing to the limited capacity of the Masonic Temple, this concert is being given at a loss financially, even if the auditorium is filled to its capacity, as the enormous expense of bringing the players from outside and the necessary social expenses are out of proportion to the size of the hall. However, it has been the policy of the Musical Art Society, and of Mr. Jordan, the conductor, to have the full orchestral complement whenever a performance is given, and the works to be played will have the same instrumentation as if played by any of the large permanent symphony orchestras. When it is considered that the amateur members of the orchestra, many of them in their teens, are receiving the season's training absolutely without charge, no effort of London should hesitate to support this commendable undertaking.

FARMERS' GATHERING

DOES NOT APPROVE
PLATFORM OF LABOR

TRURO, N. S., April 14.—Delegates from the Nova Scotia branch of the Independent Labor party met with a cold reception from the Nova Scotia Farmers' convention tonight.

"We don't like it," said any good, greeted the reading of the Independent Labor party platform. J. S. Wallace, a Labor delegate, thereupon declared the manufacturers and monopolists were successful in keeping the labor men and farmers apart in Nova Scotia.

The convention had passed a resolution protesting against the eight-day day, as tending to increase the cost of everything, and Delegate Wallace asked the convention how they expected to get into power without the labor vote.

"You've killed your chances," said he.
