## INQUEST OPENED AT SARNIA INTO FATAL ACCIDENT AT DOCKS

After Preliminary Formalities Hearing Adjourned Till Monday Night.

## BLUNDEN RECOVERS

Driver of Wrecked Auto Leaves Hospital—Suffering From Shock.

SARNIA, Sept. 9.—A jury has been empaneled to inquire into the circumstances leading to the death of Zina Martiline, an Italian workman, who died on Wednesday at the dock of the Century Coal Company, Point Edward, while engaged in loading coal for the steamer Hamonic.

Coroner Dr. T. P. Bradley held a hearing in the police court today after viewing the remains at Phillips' morgue. The inquest was adjourned until Monday night at 8 o'clock, when the following jury will hear the evidence: R. J. Hamilton, W. B. French, William Alcock, William Lumby, Herbert Couse, Charles Keller, David Brown and Walter Eddy.

Leaves the Hospital. Frank Blunden, driver of the car which ran over the embankment at South Christina street early Saturday morning, who has been in the Sarnia General Hospital recovering from his injuries, has recovered sufficiently to leave that institution today. Blunden is still suffering from shock and complaints of internal injuries, but is able to be about. The young man in conversation today denied absolutely that he was married to Mrs. Watson, his companion, who was fatally injured, but refused to state whether he was married or single. It is his intention to remain in Sarnia for a time, he said, but beyond that he did not divulge any of his plans for the future.

Shortage of Books. According to local booksellers there is a noticeable dearth of public school books and school supplies, and as consequence a large number of the school children have been unable to procure the necessary supplies with which to proceed with their studies. Daily the bookstores are besieged with children inquiring for books and supplies, but it is impossible to meet their request. Orders placed for books some time ago remained unfulfilled, shortage of paper being given as the reason by the publishers for the delay.

## LAKE STEAMERS HEAR CONCERT HELD IN DETROIT

Many Border Wireless Stations Also "Sat In" on Radiophone Concert.

WINDSOR, Sept. 9.—Wireless stations in border towns covering a wide radius last night "sat in" on a radiophone concert conducted in Detroit, at which selections played on musical machines were sent through the air via wireless, and distinctly heard by operators within the receiving radius.

The program included solos by Gieseler, Helfetz and Victor Herbert, and a rousing march by Sousa's Band, every note of which was said by operators who heard the unique offering, to be perfectly audible.

J. H. O'Leane of L'Assomption College, Sandwich, reports that members of the faculty at the college using the wireless set of that institution, heard both band and orchestral selections with equal distinctness. He said tonight the faculty was greatly interested in the concert by air, and hoped the service would be continued.

F. R. Blodgett, Devonshire road, Walkerville, was another Canadian, who "attended" the concert in the air, and he said tonight he was thrilled by it. Messages from lake vessels indicated the "concert" was heard for a considerable distance by wireless operators on river and lake boats.

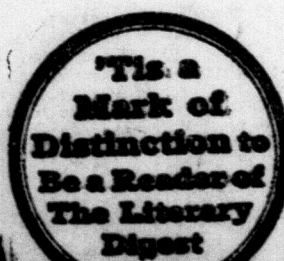
