MANITOBA HAS SURPLUS AGNEW SOUNDS WARNING

People of West Must Go Slow, He Says—Gathering Strength for Advance.

WINNIPEG, Feb. 3.—(Special.)—Hon. J. H. Agnew, finance minister for Manitoba, brought in his budget to-night. It shows a surplus for the year of \$294,841.11. The surplus is not up to last year's record, but still is a substantial one, as the provincial treasurer pointed out in a lengthy speech.

In the course of his speech, he called a word of warning and points out that the Province of Manitoba, as well as the people of the west, must go slowly. He said in closing: "We, in Manitoba, have felt in some degree the strain that has been carried on. But on the whole we have stood the test in a remarkable way. Our banking system, our financial institutions, have weathered the storm, and we have reason to hope that the check that has been experienced is only an interval in which we are gathering strength for a more decided and emphatic advance."

RAILWAYMEN'S WANTS. Will Ask Parliament for Protective Legislation.

A deputation representing the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen will go to Ottawa during the present session to ask for some change in the law regarding the liability of trainmen for accidents. The men do not wish to escape their liability, but they take the attitude that the investigation into an accident should be a wider scope. They believe that all the circumstances should be taken into consideration, including the length of time the man involved may have been on duty and allowing for errors in interpreting the rules.

The trainmen also want legislation limiting to 16 hours the length of time a man can be kept on duty in each day of 24 hours. They will also endeavor to have the maximum amount of damages which a railway employee can secure from the company raised from \$100 to \$10,000.

Help For Ingersoll Poor.
INGERSOLL, Feb. 3.—(Special.)—The suffering among the unfortunate of "Shacktown" has aroused the greatest sympathy here. A relief fund was organized at the post-office to-day, and contributions which aggregate a snug sum have been received. Clothing is also being obtained, and, together with the financial assistance, will be forwarded as quickly as possible.

TURBINA GOES BACK ON OLD RUN TO HAMILTON

Italian Arrested for Carrying a Loaded Revolver—Ambitious City Beats Buffalo.

HAMILTON, Feb. 3.—(Special.)—The Turbina will run between Hamilton and Toronto next season. That was the decision reached at the annual meeting to-day, when a loss of some \$17,000 on last year's business—when the boat was reported. The following directors were elected: J. C. Eaton, J. Vaughan, G. McGee, John Moodie, Dr. Reid Simpson, Andrew Leitch and John Knox.

At the board of health meeting this evening, Dr. Roberts, the medical health officer, reported that ten of the deaths that occurred during last month were caused by cancer. There were fifty deaths from this disease last year. There are only three or four cases left in the smallpox hospital, and the doctor thinks he has this disease well under control.

Carried Loaded Revolver.
J. Bondie, an Italian, who lives on East King-street, was locked up to-night by Constable Barrett on the charge of carrying a loaded revolver. The carrying of weapons is a habit the police are trying to discourage amongst the foreigners.

Governor Ogilvie reported to the market committee this afternoon that the city jail was overcrowded. He has only forty-eight cells and has fifty prisoners. The committee will visit the jail and other institutions under their care to see what is needed in the way of repairs.

John W. Groves, Liberal, was appointed veterinary of the department. A bylaw which proposed to regulate rag and metal shops to one on each block will be purchased by the city and others are given a chance at the next meeting to state their cases. Two new flags will be purchased for the city hall. One will be a short affair, for use when the flag has to be hung at half-mast. The other is a tall one, for the city hall, which cost \$100,000, and the amount will be increased to \$100,000.

3 MILLIONS FOR WEST FOR RELIEF OF FARMERS

Provided for in Supplementary Estimates—Some Questions and Answers.

OTTAWA, Feb. 3.—(Special.)—Supplementary estimates were laid on the table this afternoon by Finance Minister Fielding, amounting to nearly three million dollars, for the assistance of the farmers of Alberta and Saskatchewan, whose crops were damaged or destroyed by the early frosts of last fall. In the first place the government proposes to purchase seed grain and distribute it among the homestead settlers of the two provinces, the cost to be repaid by them at 5 per cent. Then the government will lend each of the two provincial governments sums for the purchase of seed grain for settlers whose patents have been taken out. The amounts are as follows:

To provide an amount to purchase seed grain for homestead settlers in the Provinces of Alberta and Saskatchewan, the cost of said seed grain to be repaid by the settlers, with interest at the rate of 5 per cent. per annum, and until repayment, to be a lien or charge upon the lands of the settlers held under homestead entry, \$550,000.

To provide an amount to enable the government of Canada to advance to the government of Saskatchewan by way of loan a sum for the purchase of seed grain for settlers, \$1,250,000. A total of \$2,800,000.

Work on Big Railway.
Replying to Mr. Kemp (Toronto) in the house to-day, Sir Wilfrid Laurier said approximately 185 miles of the National Transcontinental Railway had been located between Moncton and Winnipeg. Answering Dr. Sproule, the finance minister said the bill for the Bridge Co. guaranteed by the government had not been sold. Money was raised by the company on the pledge of the bonds of the city of Montreal, 5 per cent. interest. The amount due the Bank of Montreal by the Bridge Company for such advance and interest on June 30, 1907, was \$74,507.23.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier, replying to Mr. Martin (Quebec), P.E.I., that the government was appointing a delegate with power to discuss with the representatives of the various provincial governments, the question of the relative rights of the salt and fish industries. The government was aware of any difficulties which should prevent an amicable settlement of rights. It was not aware that the provided jurisdiction had proved detrimental to the fisheries interests of the provinces, but the government appreciated that these interests could proceed on a better and more satisfactory basis with undivided jurisdiction.

Russian Indemnity.
The premier told Mr. McCarthy (Calgary) that the government had received \$2,549 from the Russian Government in settlement of outstanding claims for wrongful seizure of Canadian vessels. The question of the distribution of this sum was under consideration.

Sir Wilfrid also told Mr. McCarthy that the government had taken action to secure the evacuation of the United States for the seizure of the steamer Quilman. The supreme court of the United States declared the seizure illegal. "The government has been and is continuing to press for settlement of all outstanding claims against the United States Government," said the premier.

Mr. Bennett asked the premier if the government intended spending any money on Port Bruce harbor. Mr. Pugsley replied that \$55 was placed in the estimates for that work.

A. G. MacKay, a political opponent. The paragraph went on to give an account of what transpired in the committee, which was absolutely devoid of truth.

Mr. Bennett congratulated "the petty paragraph" on being able to "meet the wishes of the grafters who own The Globe." The account of the proceedings of the committee, on another page of the same paper, however, was written, said Mr. Bennett, by "a gentleman."
