CARDINAL SHOCKED AT SONGS OF A SONGSTRESS

She Assumed Name of Merry del Val and Mail Package Went Astray.

ROME, April 24.—A quiet protest on the part of the papal secretary of state, Cardinal Merry del Val, caused the police authorities in this city to take instant action to relieve him of peculiar annoyance. The cardinal received a few days ago a package of mail. The contents, it is quite safe to say, astonished him. Within the envelope he found a collection of chansons, or songs of Pledigrotta, witty, indeed, but of a type fitted rather to a military mess in its hours of relaxation than to the cabinet of a great church dignitary. Police investigation solved the mystery of the delivery of such a packet at the Vatican, properly addressed as it seemed to be to the papal secretary. In a well-known cafe in Rome a woman has been singing and dancing in a manner to attract large and enthusiastic audiences, but moral restraint has not been her forte. She had assumed the name Mlle. Merry del Val and the chansons of Pledigrotta were intended for her. She may sing them, but not under the cardinal's name, the authorities having given her summary warning.

WHISTLES BLOW WHEN STEAMERS REACH SOO

City of Montreal and Winona Force Their Way Thru Ice Up River From Detroit.

Sault Ste. Marie, April 24.—(Special).—Navigation formally opened at the Soo this afternoon by the arrival of the Merchants and Montreal steamer "City of Montreal" from the lower lakes. She arrived at the New Ontario dock at 5.25, and was followed ten minutes later by the "Winona" of the Inland Navigation Co. Both vessels reported a rather strenuous trip thru the ice from Detroit. The Montreal, in charge of Captain Lefebvre, left Toronto Monday night at 6, and the trip was without difficulty until Detroit was reached. They got there at noon yesterday, and left at 4 this morning. During the trip up from these two vessels experienced packed ice, which in no instance was more than two inches thick. Reports that the ice was worse than former seasons is not borne out by Captains Lefebvre and Garvey. Both captains reported that they were about ten boats left at Detroit. When the Montreal arrived at the Soo she was greeted with city bells and whistles, and on the river saluted her with continuous whistling. Ice in Lake Superior is practically broken up, and vessels will get to experience no difficulty in getting to Port Arthur and Fort William. The Montreal and Winona will leave for those ports to-morrow.


TOULME GOT RID OF HIS INTEREST IN THE LIMITS

Went Into the Transaction Innocently and on Discovering Mistake Transferred—Sold at Loss.

OTTAWA, April 24.—(Special).—Whether or not John Toulme, M.P., can be successfully assailed for his traffic in timber limits while a member of parliament, as divulged in the house this afternoon, is a question that will be left for the politicians to fight out. At any rate it appears that Mr. Toulme went into the transaction innocently enough and got out when he learned that his action was a violation of the Independence of Parliament Act. In 1903 John Gentles asked Mr. Toulme if there was anything that could be picked up at Ottawa and the Bruce member discovered a valuable timber limit. Two went to the brother-in-law of Mr. Sifton, and Mr. Toulme and Gentles got the other three, paying therefor \$2400. The limits were held for three years, during which time they paid \$1000 in ground rental, \$250 commission and other charges, making the limits stand them \$4700. In the meantime Mr. Toulme learned that he was dangerously near the provisions of the act, and transferred his interest to another on the understanding that if the limits were sold at a loss Mr. Toulme would stand the loss. The limits were sold for \$4000, and Mr. Toulme is out \$700.

INDEPENDENT OPENS W. WRIGHT TO CAMPAIGN

Alex Wright Gets Off to a Good Start at Brockton Hall.

A. W. Wright, president of the Public Ownership League, and its candidate for the legislature in West Toronto, opened his campaign with a well-attended meeting last evening in Brockton Hall. He had been a good Conservative, but there were limits, and when a great question came up he would work inside the party for it, if possible, but if not, then outside of it. While advocating public ownership he would give loyal support to the government, and be as good a Conservative as an honest man could.

It was a dangerous thing in a democratic country where the people ought to rule, that it was in the United States that the people should own no property and one-eighth should own seven-eighths of it.

There never was a nation that had fought bravely for their boarding-houses. When people owned their homes they gave their interest to the nation, but where could be no patriotism in a nation of landlords and boarding-house tenants.

Mr. Wright was a very good man, but he was not an angel, and had no feathers sprouting under his coat.

Had he been in the legislature, Col. Hugh Clinton would have said almost alone to protest against the C. N. R. guarantee. The guarantee might be all right, but for years he had protested against the policy of bringing down railway subsidies at the last moment.

Mr. Wright had himself proposed to meet the members of the Liberal party this evening.

"If you want to make the party clean and keep it so, put independent men in charge," said Mr. Wright, who announced himself in favor of cumulative voting to secure minority representation, but thought the A and B system in Toronto would prevent jumping, which led to corruption and log-rolling. He would have an impartial, non-partisan committee to register the constituencies every census period.

Mr. Wright was not favorable to personal canvassing, agreeing with Hon. M. C. Cameron that it was not dignified for either the candidate or the voter.

Col. Hugh Clark, M.L.A., believed, he said, as earnestly as Mr. Wright that the security obtained by the Ross government for the previous guarantee was not good security. The parallel road built by the C.P.R. had also weakened the security of the Mackenzie road.
