ASSESSMENT ACT CHANGES

Special Committee of Legislature Meets To-day.

Some important changes in the Assessment Act will be discussed by the special committee of the Ontario Legislature appointed at last session to deal with the proposed amendments to the act, which meets at 10.30 this morning in the private bills committee-room at the parliament buildings.

The committee members among its members Premier Whitney, Hon. W. J. Hanna, Hon. Col. Matheson and Hon. I. B. Lucas. While the members of their own chairmen, it is understood that Hon. W. J. Hanna will be chosen for the office.

Of the 66 suggested amendments on the program, those which are regarded as the most contentious are the ones dealing with railway taxation, with the business assessment of retail merchants, and the assessment of farm lands in cities, towns and villages.

Petitions have been received from 195 municipalities asking for power to tax improvement values at a lower rate than land values. It is proposed to treat the business assessors of electric companies and of express companies, and the assessment of farm lands in cities, towns and villages.

This important declaration upon the policy of government ownership is contained in a letter addressed by the Hon. Mr. Thomas, postmaster-general of Australia, to Dr. R. M. Coultter, who was sent to Australia and New Zealand and Great Britain by the Canadian Government early this year, to promote negotiations regarding the all-Red steamship route project.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier laid on the table of the house to-day the report of Dr. Coultter. While New Zealand agrees to name a delegate to wait on the imperial authorities, and urge them to take such steps as will lead to the inauguration of the proposed service, nothing of a definite nature was accomplished insofar as Australia was concerned. A promise was given by Premier Fisher that the Australian government would be named Australia refused, however, to commit itself to any share of the cost, on the ground that the commonwealth could not do anything until the expiration of the limitation of its expenditure fixed by the constitution.

VALIDITY OF AGREEMENT

Trenton Electric Co. Would Ignore the People's Vote.

NAPANEE, Nov. 22.—(Special.)—Chief Justice Mulock to-day heard the appeal of A. Abbott of Trenton, to set aside an agreement signed by Trenton town council last summer with the Trenton Electric Light and Power Co. It was because of a discovery that such a bylaw should first be submitted to the people that resulted in the vote of last week, when an agreement even more favorable to the town than the original was overwhelmingly rejected by the people. The company, however, is trying now to establish the validity of the first agreement. The argument to-day was to sustain an injunction previously granted to Abbott restraining the completion of the deal. Stewart Meason of Belleville appeared for plaintiff; Mr. McKay, of Johnstown, McKay, Dodds & Grant, Toronto, for the town council, which, strangely enough, seeks to uphold the agreement, and Mr. Chisholm of Watson, Smoke & Co., Toronto, for the company. The argument was purely technical. Judgment was reserved.

Ship Aground. DETROIT, Mich., Nov. 22.—The S.S. P. T. Heffelfinger of Duluth, down-bound with one, ran aground last night in the west channel of the Clair Flats Canal, and is blocking traffic in that channel to-day. The east channel is open.

GAS CO. BEATS CATARACT FOR CIVIC CONTRACTS

City Buildings to Be Illuminated—A By-law For \$50,000—Tigers Banquet Art. Moore.

HAMILTON, Nov. 22.—(Special.)—The city this afternoon got an object lesson in the fixed charges of the new lighting rates of the Cataract Power Co., which the company is endeavoring to force on the people of Hamilton. The markets committee asked for a flat rate from both the gas and the Cataract Companies for lighting the city hall, and other city buildings. The Cataract declined to give a flat rate, but quoted its meter rate, in which the fixed charges alone were 47 per cent higher for the city hall than the Gas Company asked for lighting the building, and in addition that it wanted to charge for the current used. The committee gave the contract to the Gas Company. It includes the lighting of City Hall \$300 a year, market hall, \$65; jail, \$90; No. 3 police station, \$20; It was decided to submit a bylaw to raise \$50,000, \$4,000 for a new central police station and \$46,000 for an east end station.

The Tiger Football Club this evening endeavored to have a dinner to Art Moore, who will be married this week. He was presented with a cabinet of silver. Dr. R. A. Thompson made the presentation, and addresses were given by W. H. Ballard, W. H. Seymour, Don Thompson, Ben Simpson, M. M. Robinson. Manager Lazer stated that all the members of the club signified their willingness to remain in the game for another year if wanted.

The pastor of the Sherbourne-street Methodist church this evening delivered a lecture in the Centenary Methodist Church on the "Philosophy of Dickens." The Conservatives of Wards One and Seven organized to-night. A. W. Peene was elected chairman and H. Hughson secretary of Ward One, and in Ward Seven A. M. Ewing was elected chairman; Wm. Carlisle, secretary; George Will and Aid. Cooper, executives.

Robert Walker, 219 East Jackson-street, was arrested to-night on the charge of stealing a bracelet from Miss Newberry.

Hugh Scott, a Bethel lodger, whom the police accuse of passing himself as a deaf mute, was arrested to-night on the charge of vagrancy.

The police say that he was begging on the streets. He kept up the pretence that he was deaf and dumb until he was taken to the cells, when he found his speech.

Had To Sign. Judge Snider reserved judgment in the suit of the Howarth Lithographing Co. against Mrs. Maguire for an account of \$288.48. The plaintiff contended that as Mrs. Maguire had signed the contract, she was liable for the debt, which she committed suicide on May 11, she was responsible for the debts of the firm. Mrs. Maguire claimed that she never signed the contract, but her husband threatened to commit suicide if she did not.

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HOPE FOR CANADIAN CONSUMPTIVES

Sale of the Little One Cent Christmas Stamp Gives Promise of Providing Further Large Additions for Needy Consumptives.

A year ago returns from the sale of the little one-cent Christmas stamp in aid of the Muskoka Free Hospital for Consumptives made it possible for the trustees to increase the number of available beds in this institution from fifty-five to one hundred and forty. From the wide distribution that has already been obtained for the new stamp for 1909-10, it looks as though last year's success might easily be doubled. The first issue of one million stamps was put out for sale only a fortnight ago, and so great has been the demand that it has become necessary to go to press with a second million. Less than one million, all told, were sold last year.

Five days ago a letter was sent out to the managers of the various banks throughout the Dominion—about two thousand altogether. Within forty-eight hours orders commenced to come in, and every mail received at the head office of the National Sanitarium Association, 347 West King-street, Toronto, since then has included a goodly number of requests from Canadian bankers for a supply of stamps. Commercial travelers are in the front in the campaign, and on Saturday night Mr. J. H. Wildfang, one of the men on the road who has already taken two stamps, telephoned for fifty dollars worth to take out with him on this week's trip.

Stamps have been placed in book and drug stores in Toronto and elsewhere. At the meeting of the Board of Education last week a resolution was unanimously adopted to permit of the school children selling stamps during December.
