HUNDREDS RESPOND TO THE WORLD'S SOX CALL

Will "Keep Toronto Ahead" by Supplying Warm Footwear for Boys in Trenches.

BIGGEST SHIPMENT EVER

That is the Object Which Workers Will Try to Achieve in One Month.

The "Sox Day" Fund department of The World office is being deluged with inquiries, and interested readers from every part of the city were heard from yesterday, eager to respond to the call. That the men and women of Toronto are anxious to "Keep Toronto Ahead" by supplying "sox" for the boys at the front is again being proven by the hearty response to the call sent out by The World. By February 15, the day after St. Valentine's, it is hoped that the biggest shipment of sox in the history of Toronto's patriotic work will be ready to send away to the men in the trenches.

Gives Whole Floor.
The third floor of The World building, 40 West Richmond street, is ready for knitters who will be welcome every day from 12 till 5 p. m. or later. If clubs of business women wish to give their help in the evening, the work room will be held open. Please notify the "Sox Fund" Convention, Main 5308, or Park 4971. In order to hasten the supply which is very urgently needed, a knitting machine will be installed, two expert machine knitters having already offered their time.

The men of Toronto interested in boosting the campaign are urged to send money contributions so that wool may be purchased for the knitters who cannot provide their own. CHANGES ARE MADE IN THEATRE REGULATIONS

Patriotic as Well as Religious Shows Can Now Be Given on Sunday.

A change in the act regulating moving picture and vaudeville theatres allowed the provincial treasurer to grant a permit to either class of house to give patriotic as well as religious entertainments on Sundays.

The revised act issued yesterday gives the inspectors of the Hydro-Electric Power Commission absolute control of the wire installations in new buildings. Another new clause prevents moving picture houses putting on extensive vaudeville performances; henceforth such vaudeville is limited to two acts with a time limit of 15 minutes without a change of scenery.

The few changes in fees benefit the small town motion picture manager. The present fee is \$50 in population centres of 10,000 and under, whereas under the new rules this is graded down to \$10, according to population.

Bright Colors Are Also Popular With Contrasting Stripe Effects.

The latest use for beads and sequins is illustrated in the most recently launched examples of novel silk or lace hosiery. To be sure bead embroidery is by no means practical, but it is particularly effective at night time or whenever artificial light is used—and for the dance or dinner party at least this luxurious mode of adornment is permissible. Evening slippers are most elaborate and demand added novelty in the accompanying hosiery. At the present time gold brocades are very extensively featured in dance slippers, and some of the hose shown for wear with them are quite irresistible. A beautiful pair, with open work on the ankles and instep, displayed a bracelet effect in tiny gold sequins and green brilliants. They flat imitation pearls and rhinestones ornament another lovely pair of pale gray silk hose. Among the popular colors emerald green, sapphire, Bordeaux red and amethyst lead and exploit contrasting trimmings in the form of clocks, broad front ornaments, circular traceries and the fashionable bracelet effect. Some striking designs in circular and up and down stripes have been launched, and also a number of half-and-half novelties, but among the most pronounced favorites are the bronze lace models with imitation strap designs continuing past the uppermost strap of the dainty slippers with which they are intended to be worn.

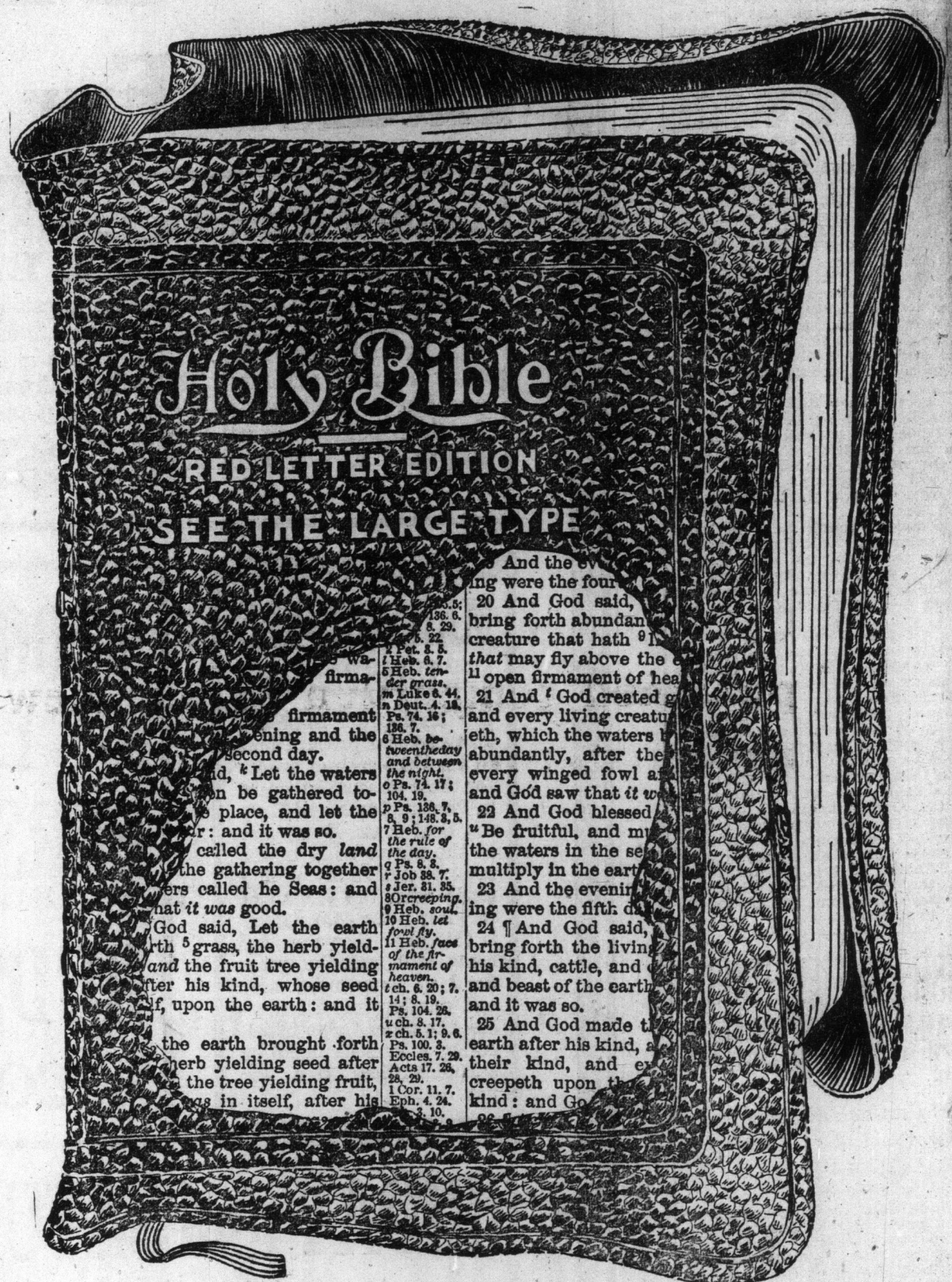
