The Canadian government merchant marine announced yesterday a general reduction in cargo rates between Canadian Atlantic ports and Great Britain becoming effective im-mediately. The former rate in effect for general cargo to Britain from Halifax and St. John was 50 cents a cubic foot or \$1 per 100 pounds; the new srate will be 40 cents a cubic foot or 75 cents per 100. General cargo covers, of course, practically all goods handled from this country to the old land. Exports only are affected.
