Lloyd George Has Refused to Negotiate Further and Strike Ballot Will Be Ordered Today.

London, March 24.-A strike of the miners is regarded tonight as almost inevitable, as Premier Lloyd George has declined to negotiate further with the Miners' Federation. The miners' conference is expected to order a ballot tomorrow, which will occupy until Easter and then a week's notice must be given before the strike can begin.

The government's offer of 20 per cent. is, roughly, two-thirds of the miners' demand. There is talk tonight of the possibility of the "Triple Alliance," which includes the transport workers and railwaymen, taking a hand in the dispute. The miners have very little sympathy from either the press or the public.
