the belt, with more predicted and the crop will need warmer until Oct. 1 to escape the production of a large percentage of soft corn. The character of the buying today was relatively better than in the past and was considered influential. Prices are not likely to be greatly depressed before a mid-September break.

There was no feature. Commission houses were fair but the future and market closed firm. Provisions—Fresh lard troubles at the yards caused liquidation by outside holders and people who have recently been buying for investment. Prices are abnormal low, but may go moderately lower before price is restored.

Cheese Markets. Peterboro, August 31.—(Special).—The regular meeting of the Peterboro cheese board was held here this morning. The present buyers were Messrs. Whitson, Fitzgerald, Cook, Taylor, Gillman, Collins and Wrighton. There were 607 boxes of cheese sold.

Cables Easter—Trade Slow at the Montreal Market.

New York, Aug. 31.—Beef—Receipts, 18,212; steers, slow, 10c lower; bulls, dull, but logical; butchers' cows, moderate. Texas and half breeds, \$3.00 to \$4.00; bulls, \$2.25 to \$4.35; cows, \$1.20 to \$3.40; shipments, 2,600 quarters of beef.

Sheep and Lambs—Receipts, 6,078; sheep, steady; lambs, steady to strong; top grades shade higher; about all sold; sheep, \$2.00 to \$4.25; culls, lambs, \$1.00 to \$1.75; culls, \$1.00 to \$1.75.

Well-Known English Professor's Fall Down a Precipice. Geneva, Sept. 2.—The body of the Rev. Dr. Henry Palm Curney, with his neck broken, was discovered at the foot of a precipice on the mountains above Arolla.

Prof. Curney was probably caught in a storm. It was discovered that he was missing on Sunday, and search-parties were organized, but it was not until next morning that the tragic and fatal accident was discovered.

St. Peterburg, Sept. 1.—The Russian outfit for feeding General Kurto-patkin's army, which was supplied from mills are working—three supplied from Moscow, each grinding 2,000 pounds daily, and two from Odessa, each grinding 1,400 pounds, besides 28 hand mills with the army, furnished by Warsaw subsistence.

Toronto Junction, Aug. 31.—The customs returns at Toronto Junction show a large increase in the value of imported goods for the month of August, compared with the corresponding month last year. The total value of goods amounted to \$84,585, compared with \$49,045 in August of last year.
