We had a good revival at the Uttersson appointment, when quite a large number, for this part of the country, professed conversion, and united with us. We received from Huntsville Mission sixty members, and have taken on trial thirtyeight. After making up for ten who removed, one who died, and seventeen whom we had to drop, we report a net increase of 10 ; membership, 70.

PORT CARLING.—(*No Report.*) Members, 86.

HUNTSVILLE was deprived of the services of its pastor by affliction last October, and was three months without a supply ; as a result of this the Connexional and other funds suffered severely, and at some of the appointments the society was almost scattered. Early in January the Chairman secured the services of Bro. R. Mayes, a deeply devoted local preacher, under whose labour the work has been vigorously prosecuted. The congregations increased, especially that in Huntsville, which fills the church on the Sabbath evening. This is a fine field of labour with openings constantly increasing, where new appointments could be established were we able to enter upon them. Members, 120.

PERRY AND ARMOUR.—This is an entirely new field, having been regularly supplied only since last Conference. Organization has been a prominent feature of this year's work. There have been a number added to the Church, as the result of two protracted meetings. We now have seven appointments, an organized Quarterly Board, and a membership of 45 ; increase, 25.
